

COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Steele County.

Sherbrooke, N. D., April 4, 1898.
Board of county commissioners convened at 10 o'clock a. m., in regular session. Present O. W. Williams, chairman, and Commissioners King, Johnson, Rindy and Cochrane.

The minutes of the meeting of March 26, 1898, were read and approved.

On motion the petition to send Andrew L. Nelson to the Keeley Institute at Fargo, was taken from the table.

After some discussion, on motion said petition was laid on the table.

The Finley Golden Slope having filed its affidavit of circulation as required by law, on motion the Finley Golden Slope was designated as one of the official newspapers, for the remainder of the year 1898. All members voting aye.

The following places were on motion designated as market places for the sale of chattel mortgage foreclosure, for the ensuing year:

In Newburg township, at the residence of Lewis Thompson on section 9.

In Norway township, at the school house on section 26.

In Norman township, at the front door of Long's livery barn in the village of Sharon.

In Greenview township, at Mardell postoffice on section 22.

In Sherbrooke township, at the front door of the court house in the village of Sherbrooke.

In Primrose township, at the residence of J. M. Patterson on section 10.

In Enger township, at the residence of Iver Thompson on section 18.

In Edendale township, at the residence of Osborne Russell on section 34.

In Colgate township, at the front door of Orser's store in the village of Colgate.

In Riverside township, at the residence of Porter Kimball on section 28.

In the incorporated town of Hope, at the front door of Hill's livery barn in the village of Hope.

On motion the county treasurer and the county auditor were instructed to distribute the dog tax funds in the county treasury, and to credit the same to the respective towns from which the same have been collected, and further, to pay the same over to the respective town treasurers, the same as other township and village funds are paid.

The following resolution was adopted: In accordance with chapter 103, of the session laws of 1897, and section 1694 of the revised codes of 1895, of the state of North Dakota:

It is Herely Ordered, That each person shall destroy upon all lands in Steele county, which he or she may own or occupy, all weeds of the kinds known as Canadian thistle, cocklebur, mustard, wild oats, French weed and Russian cactus. Said weeds shall be destroyed either by pulling or burning the same, or by any other method that shall completely destroy said weeds and prevent them from going to seed.

The time for destroying said weeds shall be for Canadian thistle, cocklebur, mustard and wild oats, between the first day of June and the first day of July, 1898, and for French weed and Russian cactus, between the first day of June and the first day of October, 1898.

The county auditor is hereby instructed to publish notices of the time and manner of destroying such weeds, in the Steele County Tribune, Hope Pioneer and the Finley Golden Slope, for two consecutive weeks, and said last publication being made at least two weeks prior to said first day of June, 1898, and also to mail printed copies of sections 1684, 1685 and 1686, of the political code, and chapter 103 of the session laws of this resolution, to the chairman of each township board of supervisors, and each overseer of highways, as provided in said law.

The following bridge petitions were filed and presented to the board:

Petition of Anton Miller and others for a bridge over the river crossing the section line between sections twenty-three and twenty-six, Sherbrooke township.

Petition of H. V. Ryther and others for a bridge over the coulie, crossing the section line between s-w 1/4 section 31, Golden Lake township, and n-w 1/4 section 6, Sherbrooke township.

Petition of O. H. Windles and others for a bridge over the coulie crossing the section line between sections 31 and 32 Norway township.

Petition of Lars A. Bjerke and others for a bridge over the coulie crossing the section line between sections twenty-eight and twenty-seven, Norway township.

Petition of Henry Johnson and others for a bridge over the middle branch of Goose River between sections twenty-six and twenty-seven, Enger township.

Petition of E. M. Sondreal and others for a new bridge across Little Forks of Goose river, between sections thirty-two and thirty-three, Newburgh township.

Petition of S. F. Pope and others for a bridge across the coulie between sections twelve and thirteen, Colgate township.

Petition of A. J. Arneson and others for a bridge across the slough between sections fourteen and twenty-three, Greenview township.

Petition of E. Moe and others for a bridge across the coulie between sections seventeen and eighteen, Golden Lake township.

The petition of H. C. Rud and others for a bridge across the middle branch of Goose river between section six Primrose township and section one, Sherbrooke township, laid on the table April 13, 1897, was on motion taken from the table.

On motion O. W. Williams, R. B. Cochrane and G. O. Johnson, were appointed a committee to inspect the sites of bridges petitioned for in Greenview, Golden Lake and Norway townships,

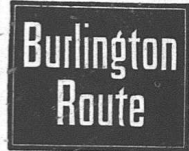
