Judgment in tax proceedings under the provisions of chapter 67 session laws of 1897, in which issue had been joined having been entered. On motion the Hope Pioneer, a weekly newspaper, printed and published in the Incorporated Town of Hope, Steele county, N. D. was designated as the paper in which the sheriff of the county of Steele, state of North Dakota shall publish the notice of tax judgment sale of the tracts or parcels of land against which judgment has been entered and which have not heretofore been sold as provided by section 12, chapter 67, session laws of 1897, and said sheriff directed to give notice of sale therein, and to sell said tracts or parcels of land as provided in said law.

All of the business before the board having been completed, and O. W. Williams chairman of said board having completed his duties for the meeting, thereupon the written resignation of O. W. Williams as county commissioner of the fourth commissioner district of Steele county, N. D., was filed with the county auditor, setting forth the fact that Mr. Williams was about to enter upon the duties of county treasurer, and desired that such resignation take effect forthwith.

On motion said resignation was accepted, and the office of county commissioner for the fourth district of Steele county was declared vacant.

On motion H. J. Rindy was elected chairman.

In order to immediately meet as a board of appointment; on motion the board adjourned until 10:30 o'clock a. m. same day.

point a county commissioner for the fourth commissioner district of Steele county N. D., by ballot, and that the first ballot be informal.

Laor King nominated Henry Patton, and Charles G. Boise nominated E. G. Erickson.

An informal ballot was then taken. The result of the informal ballot was, E. G. Erickson 3 votes, Henry Patton, 2 votes and K. H. Brunsdale 1 vote.

The board then took a formal ballot which resulted as follows; viz: E. G. Erickson 3 votes and Henry Patton 3 votes.

The board being unable to agree, S. H. Nelson the county treasurer was summoned to act as an additional member.

Mr. S. H. Nelson cast the deciding vote in favor of E. G. Erickson. E. G. Erickson was declared appointed county commissioner for the fourth commissioner district.

The board then made its written appointment in due form.

On motion the board adjourned sine die.
