Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Steele County.

Sherbrooke, N. D., Jan. 3, 1890.

The first Monday in January being a legal holiday, the board of county commissioners convened in regular session on Tuesday, January 3, 1890, at 10 o'clock a. m.

President, H. J. Rindy, chairman; and Commissioners King, Johnson and E. C. Erickson.

The minutes of the meetings of November 14 and 15, 1889, were read and approved.

G. O. Johnson, commissioner elect of the second commissioner district, took the oath of office and filed the same with the auditor.

H. N. Horner commissioner elect of the fifth commissioner district, took the oath of office and filed the same with the auditor.

On motion H. J. Rindy was elected chairman of the board of county commissioners for the ensuing year.

The application of Watson E. Boise to purchase the interest of the county in and to lots 5, 6, 7 and 8, block 23, original townsite of Hope, agreeing to pay the sum of \$10.70 therefor, was presented to the board.

On motion said application was granted, and the chairman directed to execute and the auditor to attest a quit-claim deed of said premises to Watson E. Boise.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Sherbrooke, N. D., Jan. 3, 1890.
Board of county commissioners reconvened at 2 o'clock p. m., pursuant to adjournment. Present, H J Rindy, chairman, and Laor King, G O Johnson, E G Erickson and H N Horner commissioners.

The time to open proposals for deposits of the county for the ensuing period of two years having arrived, the county auditor proceeded to open the sealed proposals on file, and presented the same to the board for their consideration. Affidavit of publication of notice filed.

Proposals were filed by the following banks, as follows, viz: Steele County Bank of Hope, for 50 per cent of the county deposits at 3 per cent per annum on the daily average balance during the month, interest credited monthly, subject to check or draft on demand.

Finley State Bank of Finley, for 50 per cent of the county deposits at 3 per cent per annum on the daily average balance during the month, interest credited monthly subject to draft on demand.

First National Bank of Mayville, 3 per cent on the average daily balance during the month interest to be paid monthly subject to draft at all times on demand.

Goose River Bank of Mayville, if deposits are made outside the county, 3 per cent on the average daily balance during the month interest credited monthly, deposits subject to draft at all times on demand.

On motion the proposal of the Steele County Bank, for 50 per cent of the county deposits was accepted, conditioned that said bank give good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$50,000.00, for the safe keeping and repayment of any funds deposited in said bank.

On motion the proposal of the Finley State Bank for 50 per cent of the county deposits was accepted, conditioned that said bank give good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$50,000.00, for the safe keeping and repayment of any funds deposited in said bank.

The official bond of W I Warrey as county judge in the sum of \$2,000.00, was presented to the board.

On motion said bond and the sureties thereon were approved.

The official bond of W H Butler superintendent of schools in the sum of \$500.00, was presented to the board.
