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COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Steele County.

Sherbrooke, N. D., July 3, 1900.

Board of county commissioners convened at 10 o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment.

All members present.

The board proceeded to make the semi-annual examination of the county treasurer's books and vouchers. After completing said examination the books and accounts of the treasurer were, on motion, approved as correct in every particular.

The committee appointed to examine sites where an appropriation for assistance in grading roads in Bergen township had been asked for, reported that they had examined said sites, and that they recommended that the sum of \$200.00 be appropriated from the bridge fund for the purpose of assisting Bergen township in the construction of said grades. The report of the committee was, on motion, accepted and the committee discharged.

On motion it was ordered that the sum of \$200.00 be appropriated from the bridge fund for the purpose of assisting Bergen township in constructing grades, said appropriation to be paid upon presentation to the board of county commissioners of satisfactory proof that said grades, as set forth in petition filed, have been completed.

On motion the following bills were allowed and ordered paid from the county general fund:

Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners, Acting as a County Board of Review and Equalization:

Sherbrooke, N. D., July 3, 1900.

Board of county commissioners convened at 1:30 o'clock p. m., pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

The board proceeded as a county board of review and equalization to review and equalize the real and personal property assessment of Steele county as returned by the assessors of the various township of the county for the year 1900.

For the purpose of equalization the valuations of lands exclusive of structures were, on motion, increased as follows:

Norway 10 per cent, Enger 10 per cent, Golden Lake 6 per cent, Highland 7 per cent, Colgate 12½ per cent, Willow Lake 5 per cent, Hope village 15 per cent.

The valuations of lands exclusive of structures were, on motion, reduced as follows:

Easton ten per cent, Melrose 10 per cent, Hope twp. 15 per cent.

No change was made in the valuations of lands exclusive of structures in the townships of Newburgh, Westfield, Norman, Primrose, Edendale, Lincoln, Riverside and Broadlawn.

The valuations of structures on lands were, on motion, increased as follows:

Norman 5 per cent, Golden Lake 5 per cent, Sherbrooke 20 per cent.

The valuations of structures on lands were, on motion decreased as follows:

Norway 10 per cent, Westfield 5 per cent, Highland 10 per cent, Greenview 20 per cent, Edendale 10 per cent, Melrose 20 per cent, Broadlawn 10 per cent, Hope twp 10 per cent, Hope village 10 per cent.

No change was made in the valuation of structures on lands in the townships of Newburgh, Enger, Bergen, Primrose, Easton, Lincoln, Riverside, Colgate or of the valuations of structures on town lots in the villages of Hope, Colgate, Sherbrooke, Finley and Sharon.

On motion the board adjourned until Thursday, July 5th, 1900 at 10 o'clock a. m.

Board of county commissioners convened at 10 o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

As a county board of review and equalization the board immediately proceeded with the work of equalizing the personal property assessment of the county.

On motion the valuations of horses one year old were increased as follows: Norman 27 per cent, Enger 10 per cent, Highland 6 per cent, Primrose 6 per cent, Sherbrooke 15 per cent, Easton 60 per cent, Greenview 2 per cent, Broadlawn 5 per cent, Colgate 10 per cent, Hope twp. 20 per cent, Willow Lake 16 per cent.

On motion the valuations of horses one year old were decreased as follows: Newburgh 8 per cent, Westfield 28 per cent, Golden Lake 14 per cent, Edendale 5 per cent, Lincoln 10 per cent, Melrose 28 per cent, Riverside 2 per cent, Hope village 28 per cent.

No change was made in the valuation of horses one year old in Bergen town-

ship.

On motion the valuations of horses two years old were increased as follows:

Norway 6 per cent, Norman, 16 per cent, Enger 33½ per cent, Golden Lake 8 per cent, Bergen 3 per cent, Primrose 6 per cent, Sherbrooke 9 per cent, Greenview 32 per cent, Lincoln 19 per cent, Willow Lake 38 per cent.

The valuations of horses two years old were, on motion, decreased as follows:

Newburgh 7 per cent, Westfield 14 per cent, Highland 4 per cent, Greenview 19 per cent, Edendale 8 per cent, Melrose 2 per cent, Riverside 4 per cent, Broadlawn 14 per cent, Colgate 5 per cent, Hope village 12½ per cent.

The valuation of horses three years old or over were, on motion, increased as follows:

Norway 9 per cent, Norman 14 per cent, Enger 25 per cent, Golden Lake 23 per cent, Primrose 3 per cent, Sherbrooke 11 per cent, Easton 9 per cent, Lincoln 20 per cent, Colgate 20 per cent.

The valuations of horses three years old or over were, on motion, decreased as follows:

Newburgh 6 per cent, Highland 1 per cent, Bergen 5 per cent, Greenview 22 per cent, Edendale 4 per cent, Melrose 12½ per cent, Riverside 16½ per cent, Broadlawn 1 per cent, Hope twp. 14 per cent, Willow Lake 4 per cent, Hope village 29 per cent.

No change was made in the valuations of horses three year old or over in Westfield township.

No change was made in valuations of stallions kept for service.

On motion the board adjourned until 1:30 o'clock p. m. of same day.

Board reconvened at 1:30 o'clock p. m. pursuant to adjournment.

All members present.

The valuations of cattle one year old were, on motion, increased as follows: Newburgh 14 per cent, Golden Lake 2 per cent, Bergen 15 per cent, Primrose 10 per cent, Easton 30 per cent, Lincoln 20 per cent, Broadlawn 15 per cent, Colgate 14 per cent, Willow Lake 4 per cent, Hope village 37 per cent.

The valuations of cattle one year old were, on motion, decreased as follows:

Westfield 10 per cent, Norman 2 per cent, Highland 9 per cent, Sherbrooke 9 per cent, Greenview 4 per cent, Edendale 30 per cent, Melrose 2 per cent, Riverside 17 per cent, Hope twp. 15 per cent.

No change was made in the valuations of cattle one year old in the township of Norway and Enger.

The valuations of cattle two years old were, on motion, increased as follows:

Newburgh 27 per cent, Westfield 38 per cent, Norman 3 per cent, Enger 3 per cent, Golden Lake 10 per cent, Bergen 8 per cent, Primrose 8 per cent, Colgate 26 per cent, Willow Lake 35 per cent, Hope village 15 per cent.

The valuations of cattle two years old were, on motion, decreased as follows:

Norway 2 per cent, Highland 4 per cent, Sherbrooke 20 per cent, Easton 3 per cent, Greenview 18½ per cent, Edendale 21 per cent, Melrose 20 per cent, Broadlawn 2 per cent, Hope twp. 7 per cent.

No change was made in the valuations of cattle two years old in the township of Lincoln.

The board of county commissioners convened at 10 o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment.

All members present.

As a board of review and equalization the board continued with the work of equalizing the personal property assessment of the county.

The valuations of cows three years old and over, were on motion increased as follows:

Newburgh 22 per cent, Enger 7 per cent, Golden Lake 26 per cent, Bergen 15 per cent, Greenview 2½ per cent, Willow Lake 53 per cent, Hope village 2 per cent.

The valuation of cows three years old and over, were on motion decreased as follows:

Norway 8 per cent, Westfield 5 per cent, Norman 1 per cent, Highland 14 per cent, Primrose 2 per cent, Sherbrooke 12½ per cent, Easton 15 per cent, Edendale 20 per cent, Lincoln 2 per cent, Melrose 6 per cent, Riverside 11 per cent, Broadlawn 16 per cent, Colgate 2 per cent, Hope twp. 9 per cent.

The valuations of all other cattle three years old and over, were on motion increased as follows:

Newburgh 12½ per cent, Westfield 5 per cent, Norman 8 per cent, Enger 57 per cent, Golden Lake 57 per cent, Highland 12½ per cent, Sherbrooke 5 per cent, Easton 8 per cent, Broadlawn 31 per cent, Colgate 5 per cent, Willow Lake 57 per cent.

The valuations of all other cattle three years old and over, were on motion decreased as follows:

Greenview 25 per cent, Edendale 7 per cent, Lincoln 10 per cent, Melrose 8 per cent, Riverside 17 per cent, Hope twp. 33½ per cent.

No change was made in the valuations of all other cattle three years old and over, in the township of Primrose.

The valuations of mules and asses one year old, were on motion increased as follows:

Norway 39 per cent, Enger 30 per cent, Primrose 39 per cent, Easton 100 per cent, Edendale 16 per cent.

The valuations of mules and asses one year old, were on motion decreased 21 per cent in Highland township and 30 per cent in Sherbrooke township.

The valuations of mules and asses three years old and over, were on motion increased as follows:

Newburgh 76 per cent, Norman 36 per cent, Enger 12½ per cent, Golden Lake 17 per cent, Highland 7 per cent, Bergen 7 per cent, Sherbrooke 29 per cent, Easton 40 per cent, Edendale 29 per cent, Broadlawn 18 per cent, Colgate 7 per cent, Willow Lake 61 per cent.

The valuations of mules and asses three years old and over, were on motion decreased as follows:

Norway 8 per cent, Westfield 8 per cent, Primrose 12½ per cent, Greenview 20 per cent, Lincoln 3 per cent, Melrose 20 per cent, Riverside 31 per cent, Hope township 28 per cent.
