Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners, Acting as a County Board of Review and Equalization:

(Continued from last week.)

Afternoon Session.

Sherbrooke, N. D., July 6, 1900.

Board of county commissioners convened at 1:30 o'clock p. m., pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

On motion the valuation of sheep were increased 21 per cent in each of the following townships:

Norway, Westfield, Golden Lake, Highland, Bergen, Primrose, Easton, Lincoln, Melrose and Hope, and 10 per cent in Greenview township.

The valuations of sheep were on motion decreased as follows:

Newburgh 40 per cent, Norman 31 per cent, Sherbrooke 40 per cent, Edendale 20 per cent, Broadlawn 20 per cent.

The valuations of hogs were on motion increased as follows:

Newburgh 7½ per cent, Norway 26 per cent, Westfield 7½ per cent, Highland 8 per cent, Bergen 7 per cent, Sherbrooke 20 per cent, Easton 45 per cent, Greenview 7½ per cent, Lincoln 20 per cent, Riverside 20 per cent, Broadlawn 7 per cent, Willow Lake 45 per cent.

The valuations of hogs were on motion decreased as follows:

Norman 10 per cent, Enger 20 per cent, Highland 14 per cent, Edendale 33 per cent, Melrose 16 per cent, Hope twp. 34 per cent.

No change was made in the valuation of hogs in the townships of Primrose and Colgate.

The valuations of sleighs and sleds were on motion increased as follows:

Newburgh 40 per cent, Norman 12½ per cent, Enger 136 per cent, Highland 22 per cent, Bergen 4 per cent, Easton 10 per cent, Greenview 2 per cent, Riverside 11 per cent.

The valuations of sleighs and sleds were on motion decreased as follows:

Golden Lake 10 per cent, Primrose 21 per cent, Sherbrooke 32 per cent, Lincoln 21 per cent, Melrose 53 per cent, Broadlawn 1 per cent, Colgate 3 per cent, Hope twp. 18 per cent, Willow Lake 7 per cent, Hope village 45 per cent.

No change was made in the valuation of sleighs and sleds in the townships of Norway and Edendale.

The valuations of bicycles were on motion increased as follows:

Newburgh 83 per cent, Golden Lake 50 per cent, Highland 40 per cent, Easton 12 per cent.

The valuations of bicycles were on motion decreased as follows:

Norman 9 per cent, Bergen 6 per cent, Primrose 33½ per cent, Sherbrooke 24 per cent, Lincoln 57 per cent, Melrose 31 per cent, Colgate 37 per cent, Hope village 28 per cent.

No change was made in the valuation of bicycles in Greenview township.

The valuations of wagons and carriages were on motion increased as follows:

As a county board of review and equalization the board proceeded with the work of reviewing and equalizing the personal property assessment of the county.

The valuations of melodions and organs were on motion increased as follows:

Westfield 49 per cent, Norman 40 per cent, Enger 150 per cent, Highland 2 per cent, Bergen 91 per cent, Sherbrooke 33 per cent, Edendale 8 per cent, Lincoln 180 per cent, Riverside 68 per cent, Willow Lake 60 per cent.

All members present.

The valuation of household furniture was on motion increased 20 per cent in the township of Westfield.

The valuation of household furniture was on motion decreased as follows:

Norway 25 per cent, Enger 20 per

cent, Edendale 10 per cent, Hope village 10 per cent.

No change was made in the valuation of household furniture in the other townships of the county.

The valuation of agricultural tools and implements was on motion increased as follows:

Norway 45 per cent, Westfield 60 per cent, Enger 31 per cent, Golden Lake 4 per cent, Highland 13 per cent, Bergen 27 per cent, Easton 70 per cent, Lincoln 58 per cent, Broadlawn 28 per cent, Willow Lake 10 per cent.

The valuation of agricultural tools and implements was on motion decreased as follows:

As a county board of review and equalization the board proceeded with the work of reviewing and equalizing the personal property assessment of the county.

The valuations of separators and horsepowers and engines and boilers were on motion increased as follows:

Westfield 50 per cent, Golden Lake 50 per cent, Easton 33½ per cent, Colgate 10 per cent.

The valuations of separators and horsepowers and engines and boilers were on motion decreased 10 per cent in the township of Primrose.

The valuation of goods and merchandise was on motion increased 5 per cent in the village of Hope.
