Of the Board of County Commissioners.

(Continued from last week.)

Sherbrooke, N. D., July 6, 1906.

The board of review and equalization convened at 9 o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment. All members present. Minutes of the meeting of July 5th, 1906, read and on motion approved.

G. K. Jordet, having made a complaint with regard to the assessment of his personal property in Sherbrooke twp., the same having been placed on the assessment roll by the town board of review. It was on motion ordered that the personal property of G. K. Jordet for the year 1906 be placed upon the assessment rolls as follows: Sherbrooke twp. horses 3 years old and over, 30 in number, value \$900; cows 3 years old and over, 1, value \$10; mules 3 years old and over, number 2, value \$68; 20 hogs, value \$40; wagons, carriages and other wheeled vehicles, 7 in number, value \$75; agricultural tools, implements and machinery to the value of \$235; one separator, value \$100; one engine, value \$150. Primrose twp., horses 1 year old, 3 in number, value \$36; horses 2 years old, 3 in number, value \$60; horses 3 years old and over, 31 in number, value \$907; cattle 1 year old, 12 in number, value \$48; cattle 2 years old, 12, value \$84; cattle 3 years old and over, 15 in number, value \$150; all other cattle 3 years old and over, 1 in number, value \$12; mules 3 years old and over, 2 in number, value \$68; sleighs and sleds, 5 in number, value \$25; wagons, carriages and other wheeled vehicles, 7 in number, value \$75; one organ, value \$10; household furniture to the value of \$30; agricultural tools, implements and machinery to the value of \$235; 1 separator, value \$150; 1 engine, value \$350; and all other property not included in the preceding items to the value of \$100.

The average value of melodeons and other musical instruments was on motion fixed at \$9 and increased and decreased in the various assessment districts as follows: Increased—Sharon, 60 per cent; Enger, 80 per cent; Finley twp., 80 per cent; Franklin, 80 per cent; Hugo, 25 per cent; Carpenter, 80 per cent; Finley village, 80 per cent. Decreased—Newburgh, 10 per cent; Beaver Creek, 21 per cent; Westfield, 10 per cent; Golden Lake, 10 per cent; Primrose, 10 per cent; Easton, 10 per cent; Greenview, 10 per cent; Edendale, 7 per cent; Melrose, 30 per cent; Riverside, 8 per cent; Broadlawn, 5 per cent; Colgate, 8 per cent; Willow Lake, 2 per cent; Hope city, 19 per cent. No change made in Sherbrooke.

The average value of piano fortes was on motion placed at \$60 and increased and decreased in the several assessment districts as follows: Increased—Newburgh, 7 per cent; Beaver Creek, 100 per cent; Sharon, 33 1-3 per cent; Enger, 60 per cent; Franklin, 71 per cent; Easton, 50 per cent; Edendale, 45 per cent; Hugo, 7 per cent; Melrose, 2 per cent; Broadlawn, 38 per cent; Willow Lake, 9 per cent. Decreased—Colgate, 2 per cent; Carpenter, 20 per cent. No change made in Westfield, Primrose, Sherbrooke, Finley village, Greenview, Hope city.

The value of household goods was on motion increased in the various assessment districts as follows: Newburgh, 50 per cent; Westfield, 10 per cent; Sharon, 30 per cent; Enger, 100 per cent; Golden Lake, 50 per cent; Franklin, 60 per cent; Primrose, 25 per cent; Sherbrooke, 25 per cent; Edendale, 25 per cent; Hugo, 40 per cent; Melrose, 50 per cent; Broadlawn, 25 per cent; Colgate, 25 per cent; Carpenter, 20 per cent; Willow Lake, 20 per cent; Finley village, 50 per cent. No change made in Beaver Creek, Finley twp., Easton, Greenview, Riverside and Hope city.

The average value of agricultural tools, implements, and machinery was on motion fixed at \$6 and increased and decreased in the various assessment districts as follows: Increased—Newburgh, 36 per cent; Beaver Creek, 29 per cent; Westfield, 42 per cent; Sharon, 80 per cent; Enger, 10 per cent; Golden Lake, 52 per cent; Finley twp., 70 per cent; Franklin, 110 per cent; Sherbrooke, 36 per cent; Easton, 18 per cent; Edendale, 20 per cent; Melrose, 45 per cent; Carpenter, 5 per cent; Willow Lake, 3 per cent. Decreased—Primrose, 20 per cent; Greenview, 37 per cent; Hugo, 20 per cent; Riverside, 15 per cent; Broadlawn, 25 per cent; Colgate, 10 per cent.

The average value of separators and horsepowers was on motion fixed at \$100 and increased and decreased in the various assessment districts as follows: Increased—Westfield, 36 per cent; Sharon, 2 per cent; Enger, 24 per cent; Golden Lake, 3 per cent; Finley twp., 100 per cent; Franklin, 66 2-3 per cent; Easton, 5 per cent; Edendale, 80 per cent; Hugo, 8 per cent; Colgate, 3 per cent; Finley village, 9 per cent. Decreased—Beaver Creek, 33 1-3 per cent; Primrose, 6 per cent; Greenview, 4 per cent; Riverside, 22 per cent; Broadlawn, 30 per cent; Carpenter, 11

per cent; Willow Lake, 33 1-3 per cent; Hope city, 13 per cent. No change made in Sherbrooke and Melrose.

The average value of engines and boilers was on motion fixed at \$200 and increased and decreased in the various assessment districts as follows: Increased—Westfield, 60 per cent; Sharon, 6 per cent; Enger, 41 per cent; Golden Lake, 14 per cent; Finley twp., 100 per cent; Franklin, 243 per cent; Sherbrooke, 100 per cent; Easton, 46 per cent; Edendale, 135 per cent; Melrose, 30 per cent; Riverside, 5 per cent; Colgate, 17 per cent; Carpenter, 25 per cent; Willow Lake, 12 per cent; Finley village, 53 per cent. Decreased—Beaver Creek, 32 per cent; Primrose, 10 per cent; Greenview, 9 per cent; Hugo, 10 per cent; Broadlawn, 32 per cent; and Hope City, 11 per cent.

No change made in the assessed valuation of the following articles: Gold and plated silverware, diamonds, watches and jewelry, goods and merchandise, manufacturers tools, etc., moneys other than that of banks, bankers or brokers, credits other than that of banks, bankers or brokers, bonds and stocks other than bank stock, shares of capital stock, foreign companies and associations, stock and furniture of sample rooms, eating houses, etc., grain, improvements on United States or railroad lands.

The average value of bank stock was on motion fixed at \$40 per share and increased and decreased in the various assessment districts as follows: Increased—Sharon, 5 per cent. Decreased—Finley village, 11 per cent. No change made in Colgate and Hope city.

On motion the assessed valuation of elevators in Sharon was increased 20 per cent and decreased 20 per cent in Hope city. No change made in Blabon, Colgate and Finley village.

On motion the value of structures on land was increased in the various assessment districts as follows: Newburgh, 15 per cent; Enger, 15 per cent; Golden Lake, 10 per cent; Primrose, 5 per cent; Edendale, 10 per cent; Colgate, 10 per cent. No change made in Beaver Creek, Westfield, Sharon, Finley twp., Franklin, Sherbrooke, Easton, Greenview, Hugo, Melrose, Riverside, Broadlawn, Carpenter and Willow Lake.

The value of structures on city lots was on motion increased as follows: Blabon, 20 per cent; Hope city, 5 per cent. No change made in Sharon, Sherbrooke, Colgate and Finley village.

No change made in the assessed valuation of town lots exclusive of structures.

On motion the value of the unplatted portion of Finley village was reduced 5 per cent. No change made in the assessed valuation of the unplatted portion of Hope city.

On motion the value of real estate exclusive of structures was increased in the various assessment districts as follows: Beaver Creek, 25 per cent; Westfield, 10 per cent; Sharon, 5 per cent; Enger, 32 per cent; Golden Lake, 16 per cent; Finley twp., 12 per cent; Franklin, 10 per cent; Primrose, 22 per cent; Sherbrooke, 13 per cent; Easton, 25 per cent; Edendale, 6 per cent; Hugo, 10 per cent; Melrose, 10 per cent; Riverside, 10 per cent; Colgate, 5 per cent; Carpenter, 3 per cent; Willow Lake, 20 per cent. No change made in Newburgh, Greenview and Broadlawn.

J. J. Birkland having made a sworn statement as to the amount of wheat that should be assessed to him in Finley township and the board having investigated the matter, it was on motion ordered that the assessment should be corrected to 949 bushels of wheat valued at \$190.

Having completed the review and equalization of the personal property and real estate of the county, on motion the board of review and equalization adjourned and met as a regular board of county commissioners.

On motion adjournment was taken until 9 o'clock a. m. July 7, 1906.
