The value of all other cattle three years old and over was on motion fixed at \$120.00 and increased and decreased in the various assessment districts as follows: Increased: Newburgh, 12 1/2 per cent; Beaver Creek, 1 per cent; Sharon, 50 per cent; Enger, 30 per cent; Finley, 8 1/2 per cent; Franklin, 14 per cent; Sherbrooke, 19 per cent; Edendale, 6 1/2 per cent; Riverside, 5 per cent; Broadlawn, 20 per cent; Willow Lake, 2 1/2 per cent. On motion the value of Bank Stock in Finley Village was decreased 17 per cent. No change made in Sharon, Colgate and City of Hope.

On motion the assessed valuation of Elevators in Sharon was increased 19 per cent and decreased 30 per cent in City of Hope. No change made in Melrose, Colgate and Finley Village.

No change made in the assessed valuation of Grain, Improvements on United States Land, Automobiles and all other property not included in the preceding items.

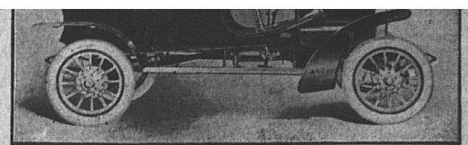

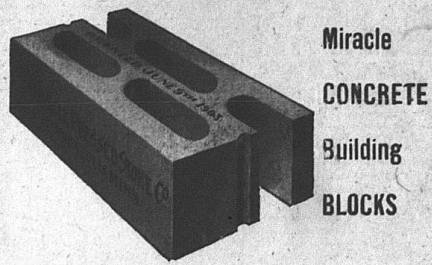
