Miss Edna Little, our talented and efficient supervisor of drawing, has been employed by the trustees of Drake University to teach drawing in that large and prosperous institution, beginning early in June. This is a fitting recognition of her ability, scholarship, and general qualifications as an instructor of drawing and history of Art. Miss Little came to us at a very opportune time, a time when opportunity afforded the reorganization of the department of drawing and she arose to the occasion, establishing a course of drawing in our schools which has passed the rigid inspection and examination of the High School Board. In working out our present system she has exercised great executive ability and foresight. Miss Little is a graduate of the Thomas Normal Training School of Detroit, Michigan, one of the best art schools in the United States. This fact together with her marked success here were strong factors in securing her this excellent position. We bespeak for her the same success which has characterized her work here. Miss Little's work in her grade is equally as good and strong as that in the department of drawing. This fact is remarkable because it is difficult to find a special teacher who can do grade work successfully. Since she became a member of our faculty, she has distinguished herself for accuracy, scholarship, discipline and professionalism and what is our loss is Drake's gain.

Mr. Wallace Nelson Stearns, Ph. D. of the University has been secured to deliver the Commencement address this year. The senior class is to be congratulated on securing such able talent for this event. Dr. Stearns is a Greek scholar of national repute and just came to this state last fall. He formerly taught Greek in the Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, Ohio, then Gambier, Ohio, and now of Wesley College, University, N. D.

An effort is being made to secure Dr. James Montgomery of Minneapolis for the Baccalaureate. Dr. Montgomery needs no introduction to the citizens of this community. Mr. Montgomery is one of the most distinguished Methodist Divines in the church of today.
