The deceased was taken sick with lagrippe and a few days after wrote home that he was better. He suffered a relapse and went to St. Francis hospital at West Superior. He was a member of the Maccabecs and carried a \$2,000 policy. Norman was a hard worker and had rustled for himself for a number of years. He was chesrful and popular with his friends, who mourn his early demise.
