DRANK CARBOLIC ACID

H. K. Rosdahl, a Hannaford Carpe ter, Drinks Poison and Dies As a Result.

H. K. Rosdahl, a carpenter, living at Hannaford, took a drink or carbolic acid by mistake and died at 10:85 Tuesday night. It seems that Rosdahl went into the drug store, grabbed a bottle containing the polson, poured some of it in a glass, and drank it down, then he ran outside and asked Almklov, the druggist, what he had taken. Two bottles were on the shelf, one water and the other poison and Almklov immediately saw the mistake made and administered an antidote and called for Dr. Wicklund who arrived in less than five minutes but Rosdahl died in the meantime. Coroner Almklov went down to Hannaford and empaneled the following jury: Messrs, Troseth, Aarestad, Stordal and Markuson, who returned a verdict to the effect that e deceased came to his death by accie dentally taking poison and that no Ŋ, one was to blame. It is a lamentt able affair and should be a lesson to those who are in the habit of running into drug storse and helping themselves to let those bottles alone in the future and it should be the duty of every druggist to see that h people do not go back and help themselves.
