

# PROCEEDINGS

## OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF GRIGGS COUNTY, N. D.

The regular July session was adjourned from day to day from July 1st until July 8th when the board convened with commissioners Buchheit, Huso and Howden present.

Commissioner Buchheit was elected chairman pro tem.

The minutes of the preceding session were read and declared approved.

Mr. A. Windingland appeared before the board in support of a petition for aid to Broadview township in the grading of a road on the county line between section 13 Broadview township and section 18 Willow Lake township, Steele county, the proposal being that the cost of the grade and culvert shall be divided equally between Steele and Griggs counties. Action by the board was postponed until the county surveyor could be consulted.
