

SCHOOL NOTES.

The drawing classes of the several grades are preparing work for Christmas gifts.

The advanced sewing class is working on shirt waists. They expect to complete Course II as laid down in the high school course of study which includes a tailored shirt waist, a cloth skirt and a complete dress.

The school has reached a total enrollment to date of 295. This is considerably in advance of the total enrollment at this time last year. The enrollment thus far in the high school has been 70. As the high school assembly room will seat only 72 we cannot accommodate many more. This growth is very pleasing.

The average per cent of attendance for the whole school for the month of November was 95, in the high school it was 96.7 per cent. There were 37 cases of tardiness in the whole school for the month ending Dec. 1. We would be very much pleased if this number could be considerably lessened the coming month.
