

Sister Dead.

Capt. A. Haskell Receives Word of the Death of His Sister.

The following notice taken from the Augusta, Me., Journal of August 31, announces the death of a sister of our old townsman, Mr. A. Haskell:

"The funeral of the late Mrs. Emma Stone took place from her late residence, Chelsea Heights, at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Rev. H. L. Nichols of the Methodist church conducted the services in accordance with the impressive ceremony of his church. There was a large gathering of friends to pay tribute to the memory of one who had proven herself worthy of the esteem of her neighbors among whom she had lived for so many years. The pall bearers were selected from among those who had known her so well. They were James Tenney, Augustus Turner, William Chase, and Wallace D. Shipp. The home was almost a perfect bank of flowers and they were most beautiful in their design: they came as tokens from personal friends and many were sent by those who felt they had known her through her son, George E. Stone, manager of the Hallowell House.

One very pretty offering was sent by a company of regular boarders at the hotel and another by the employes. The son's offering was a magnificent pillow of roses, bearing the word "Mother" that means so much to the only child. The interment was in the family burial lot at the Chelsea cemetery.
