

## Old Settler Passed Away.

Daniel Sinclair, one of the old and respected citizens of this county, died at his home in Hannaford last Friday morning, Sept. 15, 1905, at 1:15, after a lingering illness of about a year's duration. His ailment was thought to be a wasting away of the blood, known to medical men as pernicious anaemia. He gradually grew weaker, but suffered no pain, and the end came very peacefully.

Daniel Sinclair was born June 12, 1837, at St. Andrews, Province of Quebec, Canada, of Scottish parentage, descending from the Sinclairs of Argyleshire, Scotland. When but a young boy his parents moved to St. Marys, Ontario, where he grew to manhood. He was married at that place in 1863 to Miss Mary Jane Bothwell. To them were born five sons and two daughters—Fred A., Andrew, Wallace J., James H., Edith, William D. and Sarah J., all of whom with their mother survive. He is also survived by four brothers and four sisters—Robert and James, who are interested in mining projects in the Klondyke country; Moses H., a miner and real estate dealer at Los Angeles, California, and Wm. M., an attorney at Brussels, Ont. The sisters are Mrs. Maggie Stewart and Mrs. Jennie Tufts, both formerly of this county, now residing in Vancouver, and Mrs. Kate Kirk and Mrs. Mary Tufts, both residing in Ontario. Duncan and Archy Sinclair of Hannaford were his cousins.

Daniel Sinclair and family came to Griggs county in 1882 and settled on the homestead in Bald Hill township, where they resided until about a year ago, when they moved to Hannaford. Mr. Sinclair was a churchman of the Presbyterian faith and was one of the organizers of the church of that denomination at Hannaford, and his life was a constant example of the sufficiency of common-sense christianity.

The funeral was held on Sunday at 1:30 p. m. from the home, Rev. Oscar D. Puritan officiating, and burial was made in the Cooperstown cemetery, a vast concourse of relatives and friends following the remains to their last resting place.
