Destructive Hall Storm.

A very destructive hall storm visited a portion of the country lying to the north and north-east of this place last Saturday evening, at about 7 o'clock. The storm came from north-western direction, and completely demolished every kind of vegetation in its path, besides riddling numerous windows in the residences which it struck. The storm was

probably a couple of miles in width and ex-tended from the north-west as far as Pickert to the east as far as Bianchard. The ground, in the track of the storm was strewn with hall-stones almost a foot in depth, and as large as from the size of a pea to that of a goose egg. Anyone can judge as to the immense amount

of hall which fell, when it is told on good authority that on Monday morning there was still large quantities of it lying on the ground, one man filling up and bringing about a half bushel of the hall-stones to this place on Monday morning. There are perhaps others whose names we

did not learn who suffered loss in this storm. Mr. Wallace, besides having 700 acres of wheat and oats knocked completely out, had almost every window pane in the north and west side of his farm-house smashed in, and a fine gar-

den completely demolished. The storm was the most destructive hall storm which ever visited this section of country. The most of the insurance on these crops was written in the Alliance Hall Association of North Dakota, and will soon be adjusted.
