Sketch of His Career.

The subject of this sketch was born on a farm in the town of Cross, Buffalo county, Wis., on Dec. 20, 1866, and is of Scotch descent, his parents having come to Waukesha, Wis., in 1849, and settled upon land in that township. They remained until a year ago, when they moved to Winona, Minn. A. Y. More lived on the farm with his parents until he was about 19 years of age, attending the district school during the winter terms. At this age he entered the Commercial college at Winona, Minn., from which institution he graduated. He then taught several terms in the schools of Buffalo county, Wis. In 1888 he decided to cast his lot in North Dakota and taught three successive terms in the schools of Walsh county, after which he came to

Wimbledon and in 1892 commenced business as a hardware merchant with splendid success. He also conducts a large harness and saddlery business, and is a partner in the large livery barn of Toste & More. He is a young married man, and holds the respect of the entire community. Has always been the foremost factor in all things that went to build up the town and keep it in the front rank of Dakota towns. Two years ago he was nominated for the office of Register of Deeds of Barnes county, but owing to his limited acquaintance declined the nomination. At the Republican county convention on the 16th of July his name was offered as a candidate for the office of county treasurer, and he was made the candidate for that office by the unanimous consent of the convention. It is with pleasure the NEWS endorses the gentleman for this office, and if he is elected we feel confident that the office will be conducted in a business-like manner, and that the people of Barnes county will never regret the change in its official occupancy.
