Mrs. Sutter was born in Germany and came to this country when quite small, settling first in Perry county and later removing here.

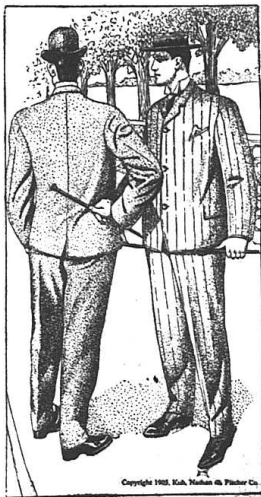
