

DEATH OF MRS. BARTHOLOMEW

MRS. WILLIAM BARTHOLOMEW
PASSED AWAY AT HER HOME IN
PINGREE THURSDAY MORNING.

Jamestown, Aug. 30—After long and painful suffering from a cancerous growth of the stomach, Mrs. Wm. Bartholomew was taken from her home here to her eternal reward Thursday morning, August 27th, at three o'clock. Death was not unexpected and was therefore not a shock to the sorrowing family.

Mrs. Bartholomew was brought to the city hospital here two months ago where medical skill could be at her side constantly and where it was hoped that an operation would cure her of the awful disease. Shortly after she was brought to the hospital the operation was prepared for and upon making the incision the doctors discovered that it was useless to cause the patient more suffering as the case was hopeless and the sufferer was informed that she would not live more than a year and possibly not more than six months. She was then taken to her home, where everything was done for her that loving hands and doctor's skill could accomplish to give her all the peace possible in the last moments of her fast ebbing life.

The deceased leaves a large number of relatives, many of whom attended the funeral and who had started from their homes several days ago in response to telegrams announcing the necessity of coming at once. Dan Bartholomew arrived Tuesday from Wisconsin, but the deceased never regained consciousness after his arrival and did not recognize him. William Bartholomew has been on his way from home from British Columbia since Tuesday and arrived in time for the funeral. Mrs. Barnes, a sister of the deceased, also arrived for the funeral from Spokane and John Buchanan and family arrived Thursday morning from Rio, Wisconsin.

The funeral took place from the Congregational church at Pingree at one o'clock Sunday and was conducted by Rev. Phillips.

Dr. Wanner of Wimbledon, Ernest Wanner of Valley City, and Prof. Theo. Wanner of the Fargo college also attended the funeral.

The deceased leaves four children, Carl, of Spokane, and William, Clair and Zoa, at home. The eldest son of the family went with the N. D. regiment to the Philippines, where he died.
