BASKET BALL

The Courtenay High School Basket Ball teams played the return games at Harvey last Friday evening. When the teams arrived at Harvey a public program was on at the hall. This deprived the teams of the thorough afternoon practice upon which they had planned and which is so essential to visiting teams playing upon a strange floor for the first time.

The Courtenay girls line up was as follows:—Vivian Durkee and Mary Robinson forwards, Inez Atwood, center and Blanche Walsh and Lucy McWethy, guards. Garnet Reisland made the first point for Harvey, making a basket from the foul line. This was closely followed by two points for Courtenay made by a field basket by Vivian Durkee. During the remainder of the first half Garnet Reisland threw two more foul baskets. Blanche Walsh threw three from the foul line and the half closed 3 to 5 in Courtenay's favor.

In the second half Vivian Durkee threw another field basket and Blanche Walsh threw three more from the foul line. During the same time Harvey succeeded in getting one field basket and four from the foul line. The game was fast from start to finish and closed with a score of 9 to 10 in the Courtenay girl's favor.

In the boys game, Robert Turner and Harry Posey played the forward positions, Frank Hoffman played center and Paul Rogers and John McWethy played guards. Both teams were in excellent condition and the game was fast from the start. The score at the end of the first half was 6 to 7 in Harvey's favor. The second half was played off with the same snap as the first. The Courtenay boys found the Harvey baskets differed just enough from the home baskets to make their shooting from the foul line an impossibility and that for this reason Harvey was getting in the lead. The Courtenay boys did some magnificent team work and made some sensation-field baskets. They were in the game every moment until the whistle sounded at the close of the last half. Robert Turner made two field baskets from difficult angles. Frank Hoffman also made two field baskets. The boys took turns in trying for baskets from the foul line but all met with the same hard luck. Out of the numerous attempts only four points were made from the foul line. Had the boys been able to score on half the fouls even, the game would have been easily theirs. The final score was 12 to 19 in Harvey's favor.

None of the Courtenay players met with the slightest mishap.

The Harvey young people furnished roller skating for a couple of hours after which refreshments were served. Everyone had a delightful time.

The Courtenay teams returned Saturday morning.
