

The plans for this building were drawn by Haxby & Gillespie of Fargo and the contract work was done by F. A. Hancock of Morris, Minn.

The new chemistry building of the state school of science is 50x40 feet, two stories with an attic and basement. It is built of Hebron pressed brick, and cased with Chaska brick. The first floor contains the office, store-room, a lecture room with raised seats, seating forty students, and several laboratories.

On the second floor are the organic, general chemistry and other laboratories and darkroom. The hoods in the separate laboratories are connected with an aspirating coil in the attic which carries off the fumes. Water and gas are supplied at each desk and hood.
