## Effigy Mound At Pingree

FIRST MOUND OF THIS KIND FOUND  
BY THE STATE HISTORICAL  
SOCIETY.

### OF LARGE DIMENSIONS

163 FEET LONG AND 105 FEET  
WIDE AT ITS BROADEST  
PART.

Pingree, N. D., Aug. 5.—Curator H. C. Fish of the State Historical Society has returned from a trip on the upper Sheyenne river where he went to secure historical data in regard to the Indian tribes of North Dakota.

While on the Sheyenne he platted a number of Indian mounds among which was effigy mound, the first one that has been found in the state. This mound is 163 feet long and 105 feet wide at its broadest part. It is in the form of a bird, the head and body connected by a long mound. Wisconsin has many of these mounds and the State Historical Society have looked for them out here, and not until last summer, when the Sheyenne was explored by Secretary O. G. Libby, have they found any thing which looked like one. The society is anxious to secure all data possible on these double mounds.
