TO THE CITIZENS OF THIS COUNTY

Having been selected as one of the candidates for member of legislature on the Democratic ticket at the last primary election, I want the people of this county to know exactly where I stand on some of the questions of the hour.

1st. I am in favor of the initiative, referendum and recall.

2nd. A law to abolish passes, franks and all special favors and privileges, especially to judicial, executive and administrative and legislative officials.
