I What might have proved to be a fatal accident happened to ۲ Herman Scheler, Sr., Monday t afternoon. While driving across c the Fourth avenue railroad cross-1 ing towards the south the engine E of the east bound local freight ۲ train was backing up for more cars on the switch and ran into ł his wagon, demolishing it and t i throwing him on the ground just outside of the track and escap-€ ing what otherwise would have I been instant death had he fallen l in front of the moving engine. Mr. Scheler claims he did not see the engine coming and that it was running at about fifteen i miles an hour and that it was impossible to get out of its way 1 at the rate it was going. Out-(side of a bad shaking up and a number of minor bruises no serious injury resulted from his fall 1 and it is considered extremely 1 fortunate that he was not in-1 t stantly killed. The horses became disentangled and ran to the corner of Atwood's store where they were caught. It is expect- i ed that the railroad company will settle for the damage done.
