

Joseph Hoggarth

The community was saddened last Wednesday evening when the news came that Joseph Hoggarth had died at his home west of this village, heart failure being the cause of his death.

Mr. Hoggarth's health had been failing for some years past and his death was not unexpected. About a year ago he was at Minneapolis to consult specialists, but since his return he has been gradually losing strength until the final summons came at 8:00 p. m., July 22nd.

Joseph Hoggarth was born in Ontario, Canada, May 21st, 1853. He came to North Dakota thirty-three years ago, resided for a short time in the Red River Valley, then came here and took up his present homestead at the time the first settlers were locating in this part of Griggs county. He lived for a number of years in Cooperstown, working at his trade as carpenter and wheelwright, but has lived for the past thirteen years on the farm.

Deceased is survived by his wife and five children, Frank and Milton, of Minneapolis, and Ernest, Florence and Amy, at home.

Mr. Hoggarth was a member of the Baptist church, having joined that congregation at Cooperstown twenty-six years ago. He was also a member and earnest worker in the local lodge of A. O. U. W., and the members of that organization paid their last tribute to the deceased by attending the funeral services in a body and marching to the cemetery with the funeral procession.

The funeral was held Saturday, July 25, from the house at 2 o'clock p. m. and from the Presbyterian church at 3 o'clock, Rev. H. L. Taylor officiating. Interment was made in the cemetery west of town.

Mr. Hoggarth leaves a host of friends to mourn his death, and the whole community sympathizes with the bereaved relatives.
