—Mr. J. B. Honeyman, of Sberbrooke, one of the finest gardeners in the state, sent down by the stage last Tuesday a large sack filled with the finest vegetables we ever saw in this or any other state. The seed of these vegetables were all sown after the first of June, and his garden has been struck with hail twice since sown. The sack contained a large sugar beet, weighing four pounds; a monster turnip and a rutabaga; three varieties of peas, one the "Pride of England," the largest and finest peas we ever saw; a couple of fine red beets; a half dozen ears of fine sugar corn; some fine string beans; onions as large as one's fist; some of the finest and smoothest potatoes we have seen this season, and two varieties of carrots, white and yellow. We have never seen the equal of these vegetables, taken as a whole. Mr. Honeyman takes great pride in his garden, and well he might. He will have all varieties of seeds for sale next spring, and those wishing to raise fine vegetables would do well to purchase their seed from him. He says that he has enough vegetables to supply Hope.
