

## OBITUARY.

Died, at Broadlawn, N. D., November 30th, 1892, Mary E. Pope, wife of Robert A. Pope, of pneumonia after an illness of only five days, at the age of 43 years, 4 months and 11 days. The deceased was born in Norway, Herkimer Co., N. Y. She removed from there with her parents, William and Ann Eliza Carpenter, to Piper City, Ford Co., Ills., in 1868. Was married to R. A. Pope, Dec. 21, 1869. They lived at Piper City, Ills., thirteen years, moved from there to Broadlawn, N. D., in 1882, where they remained until her death.

The deceased leaves a husband, one son and two daughters, also two sisters and two brothers to mourn their loss, which to her is great gain. She fell asleep fully trusting in her Savior as she told them after bidding them all Goodbye.
