Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners.

SHERBROOKE, D. T., Friday, April 12, 1889.

Board of county commissioners met at 11 o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners Oxton, Day, Thompson and Hanson.

Oxton in the chair.

The minutes of the meeting of April 2nd were read and approved.

Petition received from residents of township 147, range 57, for organization of civil township, and it was, on motion, ordered that said township be, and is hereby organized and named Bergen, and that the first town meeting in said town shall be held at the schoolhouse on section 22 in said township, on Tuesday, April 23, 1889.

On motion the boundaries of Bergen township were made to correspond with and conform to the boundaries of congressional township one hundred forty-seven (147), range fifty-seven (57).

Petition of Thomas A. Brakke and others presented for the organization of Bergen school township was granted.

Moved and ordered that all of congressional township 147, range 57, excepting sections 19, 20, 29, 30 and 31, be and hereby is designated as school township No. 20.

Moved and ordered that the first election for the organization of school township No. 20 be held on Saturday, April 27th, 1889, at the schoolhouse on section 22, and Thomas A. Brakke is hereby appointed to post the notices as required by law.

Quarterly report of G. H. Stavens, justice of the peace, for quarter ending December 31st, 1888, in case of Territory of Dakota vs. Iver K. Bakke was, on motion, allowed as follows:

Ole K. Ringerud, witness fees and mileage, \$1.00.

On motion the board adjourned till 1:30 o'clock p. m.

Board reconvened at 1:30 o'clock p. m.

Present—All members but Nelson.

The following apportionment of jurors was made:

Newburgh, Eger, Primrose, Hope, Broadlawn and Edendale, two each; Lincoln, one.

The following lumber dealers had bids in for bridge lumber:

Maynard Crane, Nelson, Tenney & Co., Red River Lumber company and Beldier & Robinson Lumber company.

The bid of Beldier & Robinson Lumber company, being the lowest, was, on motion, accepted.

The petition granted for a bridge April 1st, 1889, between sections 4 and 9, town of Hope, was, on motion, called up and same was rescinded.

M. A. Westcott presented a bill amounting to \$72.00 for building a bridge on section 33, town of Hope. Same was built as a private bridge, but is now on the laid out county road and is used by the public.

On motion the bill of M. A. Westcott was laid on the table until the next meeting of the board.

Application received from E. S. Seymour to lease lots 4, 5 and 6, block 6, in the town of Sherbrooke.

Moved and ordered to grant the application of E. S. Seymour, and that the chairman of the board is hereby authorized and instructed to execute and deliver to said E. S. Seymour a lease of lots 4, 5 and 6, block 6, town of Sherbrooke, for a term of two years, at an annual rental of \$2 per lot.

On motion a warrant was ordered issued to S. J. Axdah, county superintendent, for \$16.00, for visiting three schools and mileage during the first quarter of the present year. The teachers' reports now allowed were received since the close of last quarter.

Moved and ordered that the allowance voted to John Stine for February, March and April be disallowed.

On motion the following bills were allowed and ordered paid from the general fund, viz:

Griggs county, Steele county's apportionment of district court expenses for summers of 1887 and 1888, \$706.59.

Steele County Tribune, printing envelopes for register of deeds, \$2; publishing proceedings of April 1 and 2, \$6—\$8.

Samuel C. Linn, posting notices and mileage for organizing civil town of Norman, \$7.10.

Union School Furniture company, Battle Creek, Michigan, desks for register of deeds, sheriff and superintendent of schools, \$135.00.

K. H. Brunsdale, cash advanced for freight on desks, \$10.02.

Bugbee Bros., hauling desks from Hope, \$5; removing banking from county building, \$5—\$10.00.

On motion the following bill was allowed and ordered paid from salary fund:

K. H. Brunsdale, cash advanced for clerk hire, \$25.

On motion the following bill was allowed and ordered paid from the road and bridge fund:

E. W. Palmer, 5½ days as surveyor, \$16.50; 115 miles travel, \$11.50—\$28.

Moved and ordered that the auditor be instructed to advertise for bids to build five bridges in Steele county.

On motion the board appointed the following polling places for the election to be held May 14, 1889:

Precinct No. 6—Highland civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 15, in said township.

Precinct No. 7—Golden Lake civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 14, in said township.

Precinct No. 8—Eger civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 8, in said township.

Precinct No. 9—Primrose civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 2, in said township.

Precinct No. 10—Sherbrooke civil township; polling place at schoolhouse in town of Sherbrooke.

Precinct No. 11—Pickert civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 22, in said township.

Precinct No. 12—Greenview civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 8, in said township.

Precinct No. 13—Riverside civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 31, in said township.

Precinct No. 14—Melrose civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 14, in said township.

Precinct No. 15—Lincoln civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 14, in said township.

Precinct No. 16—Edendale civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 33, in said township.

Precinct No. 17—Broadlawn civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 18, in said township.

Precinct No. 18—Colgate civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 29, in said township.

Precinct No. 19—Hope civil township; polling place at schoolhouse in town of Hope.

Precinct No. 20—Willow Lake civil township; polling place at schoolhouse on section 29, in said township.
