

P. A. Anderson is Dead

The Hannaford community is mourning the passing of one of its respected citizens, Paul A. Anderson, who for 23 years was publisher of the Enterprise in that town. With the death of Mr. Anderson the newspaper fraternity of Griggs county loses one of its valued members and his home town a most highly respected citizen. Few men there are with the upright character Paul possessed. He was a man who wanted to do the square thing by everybody, seeming to derive special pleasure in doing favors to others.

The following is copied from this week's Enterprise:

Paul A. Anderson was born on Sunday, December 17, 1883 at Biri, Norway. The following year the family came to America and settled at Pigeon Falls Wisconsin. At six years of age he came to Mabel township, Griggs county, where he had his home with his oldest brother Andrew until he came to Hannaford in 1905, and where he has since resided.

He was baptized at Biri, Norway, received religious instruction and was confirmed by Rev. P. A. Thoreson in the Mabel Lutheran church. He was a member of the Hannaford Lutheran congregation.

He was educated in the common schools of Mabel township and at Dazey. He completed a high school course in Minneapolis and studied at the University of Minnesota.

On June 19, 1913, Mr. Anderson was married to Miss Emila Dunnun of Lanesboro Minn.

Since 1905 he has been the publisher of the Hannaford Enterprise. During his 23 years of residence in Hannaford he held at different times various village and school district offices. During the past year he was village treasurer and secretary and treasurer of the fire department.

More than a year ago he began to suffer from an internal cancerous growth. Doctors were unable to do anything for him, and after much patient suffering he passed away at 7 o'clock on the evening of Thursday, July 12, 1928, at the age of 44 years, 6 months and 25 days.

The surviving members of the family are his wife, Mrs. Emilia Anderson; three brothers and two sisters: Ole J. Anderson, Pigeon Falls Wisconsin; Mrs. O. T. Olson, Dazey; Ingvald A. Kampen, Hannaford; Mrs. John Stering and Peter J. Anderson, Conrad Montana.

Funeral services were held at the Lutheran church, the pastor Rev. E. O. Stenson being in charge. Rev. Geo. S. Natwick, Rev. E. O. Stenson and Rev. G. O. Vikan, pastor of the Hannaford Presbyterian church, spoke. The addresses carried messages of hope and cheer and were indeed heartening to the sorrowing relatives and friends. Excellent musical numbers, duets and solos, were rendered by Bertin Haugan and Rev. Stenson, with Mrs. L. Larson at the organ. There was an abundance of flowers placed there by loving relatives and friends of the deceased.

The church was too small to hold all the people who came to attend the funeral services and who accompanied the remains to the Mabel cemetery 16 miles northwest of Hannaford.

Recently Edward Towers, patrolman at the Rosedale police station in Kansas City, Kan., was standing outside the station watching motor cars roll by. He saw a car driven by Eituck weaving down the street. It stopped within 250 feet of the station. Patrolman Towers walked to where the car stopped in an effort to aid the stalled motorists.
