

# Chester Anderson

## Died Sunday

Sunday morning at 9:10 Chester Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ole O. Anderson, gave up his struggle against the dread disease, tuberculosis, with which he had been afflicted the past year. The ravages of the disease were rapid as well as deadly, for only a year ago he was busily engaged with his studies at Concordia college. Last spring he suffered a severe hemorrhage and was compelled to leave school for some time but later improved somewhat. It was only a short time ago that the startling fact became manifest that there was no hope for his recovery. While he failed rapidly he was able to be up most of the time and was able to come to town less than two weeks ago.

Chester was a bright young man and had he lived would have been a splendid character.

Brief funeral services were held at the home Wednesday at one o'clock at which time Rev. A. T. Mason of Concordia college, one of Chester's teachers, gave a short talk in English, and the choir sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere." The regular Norwegian services were then held at Mabel Lutheran church and were conducted by Rev. Thoreson. The songs by the choir were "It is Well with my Soul" and "Nearer my God to Thee." A solo in Norwegian was also sung by M. S. Bothne. Burial was in Mabel cemetery.

Chester Raymond Anderson was born August 13, 1897, on the farm where his parents now reside, and died February 21, 1915, being 17 years, 6 months and 8 days old. He finished the common school in 1911 and that fall he entered Concordia college at Moorhead, Minnesota and would have graduated with the class in June, 1915, had his health permitted. He was confirmed in the Lutheran church June 8, 1913.

He is survived by his father, mother, two sisters and one brother.
