### Within Week

**Deaths Since Friday are M. J. Thompson, Frank Starr, Mrs. John Christianson, Grandma Paulson, Mrs. A. J. Gunderson and Mrs. Oscar F. Hoff**

Within the past week this community has been shocked and saddened to a point almost beyond belief, six of our citizens having been called to answer the final summons.

#### M. J. Thompson

Last Friday evening, Martin Thompson who had been sick for some time, was the first to pass away. He had been a sufferer from heart trouble, which kept growing gradually worse, until a stroke of apoplexy rendered his case hopeless and hastened the end.

#### Frank Starr

Saturday morning at 12:20, Frank Starr gave up the fight against a short but hard struggle with pneumonia. He became sick the previous Tuesday, and almost before his relatives realized it the disease had made such inroads on his system that hope for his recovery was soon abandoned.

#### Mrs. John Christianson

Early Monday morning Mrs. John Christianson was the next to pass away. The remainder of the family had gone through a siege of flu, and the strain of taking care of them, together with doing the other work practically exhausted her so that when she was taken down she was unable to put up the fight that was necessary to overcome the disease.

#### Grandma Paulson

Mrs. Anna Paulson, who had been practically helpless from the infirmities of old age for a long time, passed peacefully away Monday morning. She had not been able to leave the house for many months, and of late the nearing of the end of her earthly life was known by her sons who have been faithful in their care for her.

#### Mrs. A. J. Gunderson

Tuesday night, Mrs. A. J. Gunderson was the victim of pneumonia which got in its deadly work almost before her husband realized that she was seriously ill. She had developed a severe cold last week, but had become better, when suddenly the fatal malady struck her. A doctor from New Rockford was called to consult with Dr. Lewis, but it was then too late to be of any use.

#### Mrs. Oscar F. Hoff

The last of the number to pass away was Mrs. Oscar F. Hoff whose death occurred Wednesday night, pneumonia being the cause. She had but recently returned from a visit with relatives near Cooperstown, and like the others, was sick but a few days.

The Thompson funeral was held Monday, Frank Starr's Tuesday, Mrs. Paulson's and Mrs. Christianson Wednesday. The body of Mrs. Gunderson was taken to Grand Forks her parents home, where inter-

ment will be made. On Friday afternoon the body of Mrs. Hoff was taken to Cooperstown to be laid to rest in the cemetery there.
