Suddenly Called Away.

On Tuesday evening of this week at her home in Wimbledon. occurred the sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. S. O. Edland, (nee Simonine Woodell.) The deceased was in her usual

health until Friday of last week; when she caught cold, which settled on her lungs and develop-

ed into a severe case pneumonia. Dr. Macdonald of Courtenay was called on Monday afternoon, but in spite of his best efforts the disease baffled his skill and the patient gradually grew worse until the end came at 6 p. m. Tues-

day. The subject of this sketch was born in Stavanger, Norway, June 22, 1873. In her twentieth year she left her native land to seek a larger liberty in the new world. She came to Hannaford in the spring of 1893 and that fall was united in marriage to now sorrowing husband. They settled on a farm near Hannaford where they enjoyed and endured life's joys and sorrows together until November of 1904 when they moved to Wimbledon where they have since lived. She leaves to mourn her loss, her husband and four children, two boys and two girls, a sister who resides at Hannaford. who was with her when she died, her father and two sisters in the homeland. Her mother proceeded her to the beyond a few years ago.

A short service was held at the house on Wednesday evening. conducted by Rev. Hewson, after which the family left on the train for Hannaford. The remains, accompanied by Mr. Mallough, the local undertaker, were carried across to Hannaford by team on Thursday, where services were held in the Lutheran church and interment took place in the Hannaford cemetery. The sympathy of the entire
