

# Another Woman Called Home

GRIM REAPER ROBS HOME OF A  
LOVING MOTHER AND  
DUTIFUL WIFE

Death within the past week has robbed this community of two well known women, the second to pass out of this life forever being Mrs. J. V. Lundeen, who died in Jamestown last Saturday.

Mrs. Lundeen first began to feel the effects of illness last April, and while not bedfast only at intervals, she kept on with her daily duties, trying hard to overcome her illness, until about June she felt as though she needed medical assistance, and she was taken to Fargo, where she was given aid by the best doctors. She spent the month there and returned home feeling somewhat relieved, but for a short time only, when she began to fail fast. About two weeks ago she was taken to Jamestown where she entered a hospital, and apparently was getting along fairly well, and only the night before she died news came here that she was resting easier and showed signs of improving, but it seems that within a short time after this news was sent out she took worse and at 11 o'clock, Saturday morning, she closed her eyes for that everlasting sleep on this earth, diabetes being the apparent cause of death.

Miss Fritzell was born in Torshall, Sweden, in the year 1867. She was married there to John Victor Lundeen 24 years ago, where they lived until immigrating to this country, arriving at Courtenay on April 15, 1910, and located on a farm south of town. They resided there until this

spring, when they moved 12 miles north of Courtenay.

She was well known and loved by all who knew her, always being of a cheerful disposition and willing to lend a helping hand in need.

She leaves a husband, one son, Bertil, a daughter, Esther, and a brother, Charles Fritzell of Chicago, who arrived Wednesday evening to attend the funeral, which was held from the Norwegian Lutheran church, services being at 2 o'clock this afternoon, conducted by Rev. Dybvik. The remains were laid to rest in the Courtenay cemetery. The remaining ones have the sympathy of the entire community, in this their sad hour of sorrow.

## Six Amendments Adopted at Polls

Six amendments submitted to the voters at the election last week were adopted, as indicated by the returns available. Only one amendment—woman suffrage—failed.

The most important of the new laws are the initiative and referendum acts. One applies to the constitution and the other to legislative enactments. The one made applicable to statutes only seems to have the heaviest vote, as there was some opposition from the prohibition forces to the referendum applicable to the constitution.

State aid for highways is provided in another of the constitutional amendments adopted. The establishment of terminal elevators within the state is provided in still another.

The classification of property for taxation purposes, and the changing of the name of the asylum for the blind at Bathgate, are provided in the other amendments.
