

Obituary.

The following is taken from the paper of Echo, Washington, and pertains to the sudden death of Harry Onstine:

It is seldom a community is so moved as was the case in the recent bereavement of Mr. and Mrs. Abe Onstine of Echo by the sudden death of their son Harry, caused by accident while attending to duties about the machinery of the saw mill, there being no eye witness to his death but to all appearances he was caught by his clothing in the machinery and met his death almost instantaneously.

He was born January 29, 1895, and died March 30, 1914.

It is true no human power of sympathy can check the heart-breaking grief of relatives over a loss such as theirs. That Harry was loved by all who knew him only faintly expresses the influence he shed around his relatives and companions during his life—short though it was. He was bright, cheerful and sunny in temperament and obedient at all times, he being one of the leading members of the family. The circumstances of his death were very sad, bringing tears to many eyes long unused to weeping.

The funeral was held at the Congregational church at Colville by Rev. G. H. Rice and was largely attended by friends and neighbors generally. Another expression of esteem was shown by the large decoration of flowers strewn upon his last resting place, the grave. The people of Echo and vicinity are all mourners and extend to the immediate family their tenderest expression of sympathy.
