Mrs. Wright took a great interest in woman suffrage and did much work during the recent campaign in Washington state. So effective was she that she had been asked to assume charge of a portion of the work at the headquarters in Tacoma and undoubtedly would have done so had she lived and her health permitted. Not over strong, her health has not been the best for several years but it was not believed that her condi-

tion was at all serious.

Mrs. Wright was well known to many in this vicinity, and at Courtenay where her husband used to live, and her demise will be greatly regretted. She taught school there for some time after her return from Oregon where she attended college at Newburg and where she also taught school. She was one of the early stu-

dents in Jamestown college.

Mrs. W. H. Wright was born in Shellsberg, Pa., and came to Stutsman county with her parents in 1882. She was married to Mr. Wright in 1898, making his acquaintance at Courtenay while teaching.
