### WHAT COWS HAVE DONE—

One of the most profitable herds of cows in the state considering their number, is undoubtedly that of E. J. Stone, a farmer living near Fessenden. According to reports received by the Development League Press Bureau at Grand Forks, Mr. Stone's revenue from seven cows has averaged \$18 a week all winter. This profit comes from selling cream at 30 cents a quart.

Owing to the fact that the cows are fed only on home grown feeds, it is difficult to estimate the cost of feeding. They are fed 40 pounds of silage a day, ten pounds of ground oats and barley, and 12 or 15 pounds of millet hay. In addition to the sale of cream, 30 pigs were raised on skimmed milk and pasture, and are now being fattened on ground feed. This is only one instance where a few cows and pigs have paid a larger return on their investment of time and money than did the big crops of the farm.
