TWO CENT RATE—

The Great Northern and Northern Pacific railways have issued notice that a special rate of two cents a mile will be made for the North Dakota State fair, this year. For four years past the railways have not granted reduced rates to the fair, but this year a special two cent rate is to be made from all points on the Great Northern in North Dakota and upon the Northern Pacific in North Dakota and from Minnesota points north of Manitoba Junction. This is the first special reduction in rates allowed for several years and comes only because the railways realize the educational value of the State Fair to the people of North Dakota.
