The methods of the creamery trust first in bidding up the price of cream until they have driven the local creamery out of business and then in lowering the price paid are despicable. Moreover, long shipments of cream mean an inferior product, thus bringing down the whole standard of the business. Keep the cream in the state. Patronize your local dairy for in the end it will pay. Co-operate in the creamery business with the other farmers in your locality. The time should not be far distant when practically every farmer in the state will be able to meet the running expenses of his tract of land with the proceeds of his dairy. But the first essential is to keep the cream at home.
