Latest Reports

Managua, Nicaragua, Sept. 6.—
This city is practically cut off from
communication with the rest of the
world. Food is becoming scarcer
here daily and also in several of the
cities in the hands of the revolu-
tionaries. At Granada and Masaya,
which are held by the rebels, the
populations are almost completely
deprived of provisions.

Reports have come in of engage-
ments in the vicinity of Granada be-
tween the government troops and
the insurgents, but no details of the
fighting have been obtainable.

Washington, Sept. 6.—Word has
been received from San Juan del
Sur, Nicaragua, that 500 American
blue-jackets left Corinto to re-estab-
lish railroad and telegraph com-
munication.
