

Brakeman Killed Unloading Logs

The body of Tom Elliott, of Leavenworth, Wash., arrived here over the Great Northern Friday evening, and was taken to Sanborn by auto the same evening. Mr. Elliott is a brother of Tom Elliott was is well-known in this village, having been conductor on the N. P. branch through here for a number of years. The Leavenworth Echo gives the following account of Robert Elliott's death:

"Robert Elliott, employed as a brakeman on the Great Northern Lumber Company's logging train, was instantly killed Tuesday as he was assisting in unloading logs at the log dump near the mill. He was in the act of knocking loose a chain hook, which came out easier than he had expected and the logs instantly rolled down carrying him with them and crushing the life out of him. He was working under his brother-in-law, Harry Ness, conductor of the train.

"Mr. Elliott was twenty-six years of age and is survived by his wife and little daughter and his parents, who reside at Sanborn, N. D., where his father is a hardware merchant. They had come out here in June."
