## Peculiar Case Has a Happy Termination

Readers of the Enterprise will remember that about three weeks ago, John Highland, an elderly man from Chelan, Wash., bound for Detroit, Mich., stepped off the Great Northern train here late at night, and wandered about the railroad yards till he was discovered by the coal shute men, and taken care of till his son arrived from Chelan to take him home. He was suffering from temporary loss of memory and was unable to account for his actions at the time he left the train.
