Testimony at the hearing established that the hat was in Griesinger's possession on July 1. July 2nd he was arrested on another charge, ought before Police Magistrate Rearick and released on bond and returned to his home, which is some three miles east and north of the Curtis farm. Wes Flick and son Walter fiad taken him home in their auto and remained there for some time. Griesinger's bondsmen withdrew on July 3rd and he was taken into custody on the former charge, hich was for ass saulting Mrs. Hard-
