

The Memorial Services

The memorial services held under the auspices of the Hannaford A. O. U. W. lodge and the Degree of Honor Sunday, were somewhat handicapped by the extremely hot weather which kept many from going who otherwise would have been present, but in spite of this there was a good attendance.

The services were opened by a song by the audience, Scripture reading by Rev. J. C. Wilson, following which W. H. Richardson introduced the speaker, Judge T. A. Cole of Fargo who delivered the memorial address. He narrated the services the soldier boys, as well as the nurses and women of the Red Cross and other organization, have rendered their country, his theme being that they have made the world safe for Christianity, thereby making it safe for democracy and for all our cherished institutions. Benediction was pronounced by Rev. P. A. Thoreson, after which the audience dispersed.

The service flag which was displayed on the stage is to bear seventy-six stars, one for each soldier who has gone out from this community in his country's service. Of this num-
