## Be Prepared to Answer the Census Man.

On January second Uncle Sam began the count of his big family, one of the biggest in the world, and of course the best family in the world.

Mr. M. E. Wickham has been appointed census enumerator for the Townships of Greenfield and Bartley and for the Village of Hannaford, and when he comes around be prepared to answer all the questions:

He will ask you a lot of questions and will expect full and complete answers. Personal differences between man and wife as to temporary chieftanship will be no concern to the enumeration, nor is politics of any moment. Husbands are listed as heads of the families.

Age is another question everyone will be asked. And feminine modesty must be set aside when the census time comes, for Uncle Sam imposes a jail sentence for refusal to answer census questions.

On what street do you live?

What is the number of your house?

What is your surname, your given name and middle initial?

Are you the head of the family, the wife, the son, daughter, sister, brother, mother, father, boarder, servant, grandmother, grandfather, grandson, granddaughter, niece, nephew, uncle or aunt?

Do you own the home or rent it, and if owned, is it mortgaged? The amount of mortgage will not be asked.

What is your sex?

What is your color?

Are you single, married, widowed or divorced?

In what year did you immigrate to the United States?

Are you naturalized or an alien?

If naturalized, in what year?

Have you attended school since September 1, 1919?

Are you able to read?

Can you write?

In what state or foreign country were you born?

Where was your father born and

what was his mother tongue?

Where was your mother born and what was her mother tongue?

What is your trade profession or particular kind of work done?

In what industry do you work?

**Corn, 119 Bushels on One Acre**  
 One North Dakota acre in Sargent county produced 119 2-3 bushels of mature corn this year. Wesley Cooper, a member of the North Dakota Boys' and Girls' Clubs, won a state championship on his acre of corn. This won for him a trip to the Boys' and Girls' Institute, a week's course in Agriculture and Home Economics given at the North Dakota Agricultural College for club winners. He planted home grown seed May 19th. Eight loads of manure were put on this ground. The corn was cultivated four times. His yield last year was 71 bushels. George Allison of Grand Forks county wins second place with 115 bushels. The average yield of the 90 club members reporting was 38 1-3 bushels. Yields in the western part of the state were reduced by dry weather and grasshoppers. The outstanding facts in connection with the big yields were, tested, well bred, home grown seed, early planting and clean cultivation. Another factor was the favorable weather for the corn.
