Embezzlement in Boston.

Arthur H. Blaney, cashier and head-book-keeper of the Massachusetts Loan and Trust company, has confessed to embezzling \$44,000 of the company's funds owing to mining and other stock speculations. The first intimation of anything wrong was on the afternoon of the 18th inst., when it was found that Blaney was \$7,000 short in his accounts. His attention being called to the discrepancy, he said he had taken it for temporary use and would restore it the next morning. He did so, and being questioned about other possible discrepancies, assured the president of the company that his deficit did not exceed \$7,000. It was deemed best to suspend Blaney.
