Your letter to Mr. Z. A. Clough was forwarded by her to my aunt, Thirza Gimblett Taylor, in Pasadena who in turn sent it back to me asking that I give you as much of the information as possible. It just happens I was one of the very youngest of our family and my memory does not serve that far back. Mother and I have talked it over, but there are many things which she seems to have forgotten so I am afraid we cannot give you very much information.

I am quite interested in seeing that you are making a history of the early days in Cooperstown. I am a member of the Pioneer Daughters Organization, and I am enclosing a copy to you of the pioneer story written by mother, the original of which is now on file with the Historical Society in Bismarck. It is just possible there might be one or two things in it which would be of interest to you in compiling your history.

I certainly regret that I cannot give you more details along the lines requested.
