



Zuger said many of this country's highest-placed persons "have become citizens on their petitions to do so—as you have done.

"It takes optimism, faith and courage to break old ties and start anew in a new country," he said. "But optimism, faith and courage also are the qualities which have made this country great."

Zuger discussed the responsibilities of American citizenship, and said that "This government is now your government; it will be as honest, decent and great as we are or as we wish to make it, or it will fall through our failure to accept our obligations."

Presiding at the ceremonies was Judge Charles J. Vogel. The candidates were presented by Clifford W. Milburn of the immigration and naturalization service, who told the court the class included 16 displaced persons "who have been more than diligent in fulfilling the requirements of citizenship."

Following the ceremony, the new citizens were presented American flags by Donald H. Crothers, who represented the Fargo Elks. Members of the Women's Relief Corps presented the group with patriotic literature. At noon, the class of 38 persons were guests of the Kiwanis Club at luncheon.




