In reviewing the progress of the Griggs County Soil Conservation District we, as your elected Board of Supervisors, recognize the continued problems with which we must contend as land operators. The problem of too little or too much rain at the right or wrong time, the flooding of potholes or low lying areas, wind and water erosion, and inadequate pastures due to the irregularity of moisture still continue to require our attention.

Technical Services



A very effective method through the use of cover crops this method.

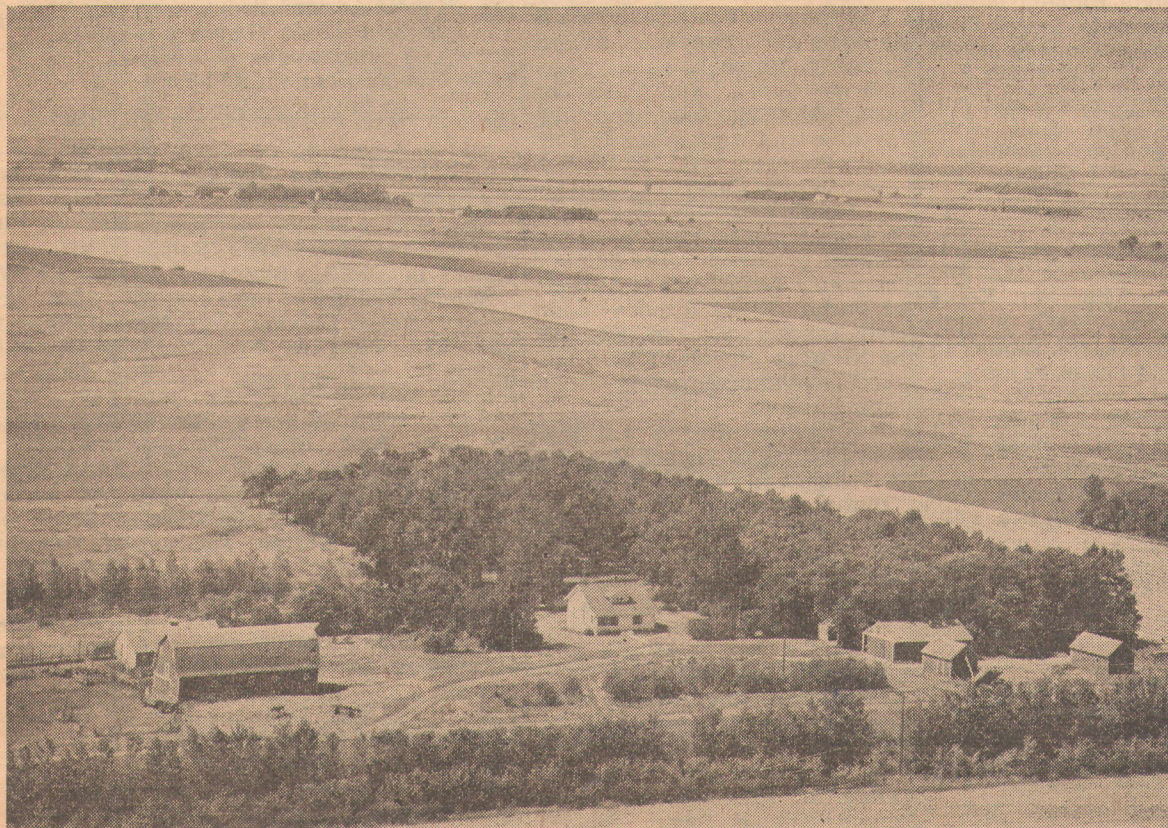
The seeding to permanent grass is highly commendable. The erosion of land that had been tilled is reduced. Also we cannot plant more than 5,000 acres seed crops for a shorter period of crop rotations.

Trashy fallow has been reduced both wind and water erosion. The value of land is increased as long as the farmer is allowed to plant 10 to 15 times. During this time the material is ground to powder and more subject to erosion. We urge our cooperators to till their fields in order to prevent erosion of their soils.

Trees

A further means of preventing erosion is the planting of field shelterbelts. At this time we urge every farmer to plant one row planting plan space. In the spring we planted 96 acres of field shelterbelts. To date we have planted a total of 805.5 acres. Our total planted acres to farmstead belts is 805.5 acres. Our total planted acres. 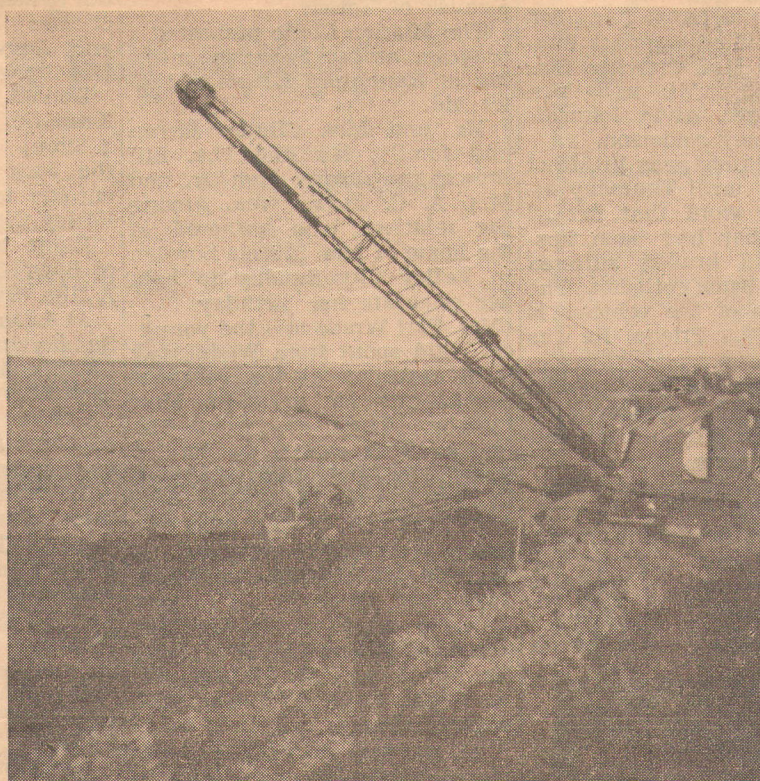

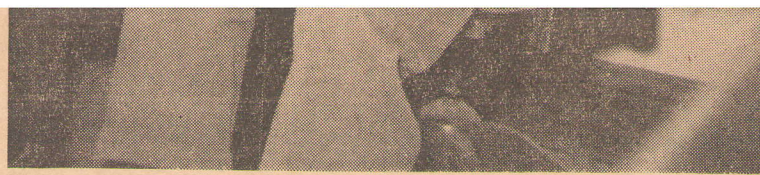

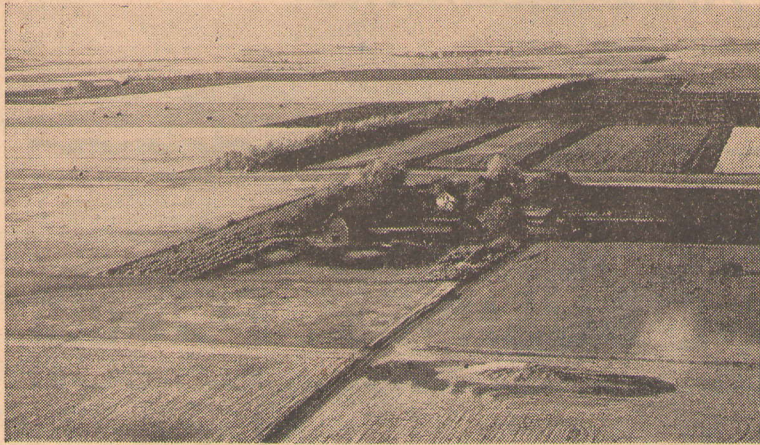
Paul Owen has replaced Vic Legler as County Agent. Mr. Legler has gone into farming at Jamestown.

In the farm planning work with the 520 cooperators the above problems have been studied for each individual farm. Solutions have not been found for all, but many answers have been worked out and practices applied which will more effectively bring about the desired results.

ASC

Our usual good relationship with ASC has prevailed the past year. Funds, made available by the ACP program, and regulated by the County Committee, encouraged farmers to further the program of the District, to get more conservation on the land. Tree planting, stock ponds, dams, grass planting, strip cropping, contour farming and all the practices necessary to good conservation have been helped by this program. The present County Committee is: Chairman, Clarence Steffen; James Hazard and Herb Sonju. The office manager is Henry Herigstad of Cooperstown.

The District, of course, has the cooperation of other agencies, such as Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Forestry Service, GNDA, Implement Dealers' Association, the N. Dak. Bankers Association, Wildlife Service and others.

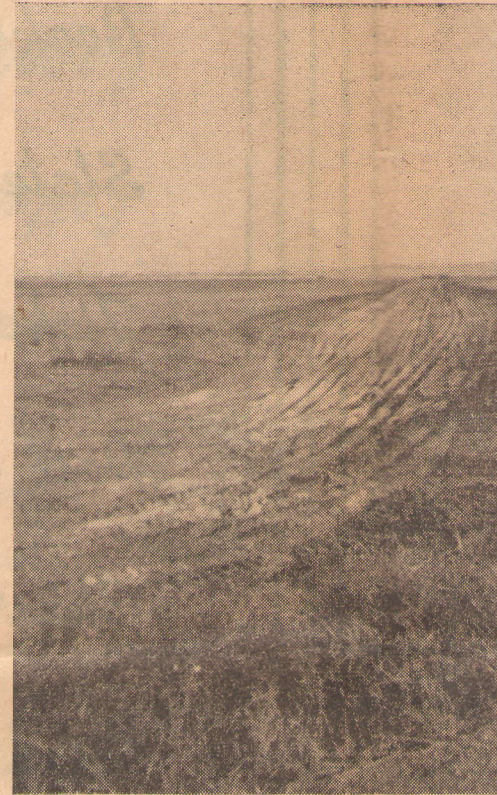


Wind Erosion

Wildlife

The District has been cooperating with the Wildlife
Service to improve wildlife habitat through the planting of
tree belts. The Wildlife Service supplies the planting stock
and pays for the planting with the district doing the plant-
ing work. 221 acres have been planted to trees for wildlife
habitat.

Educational

Two scholarships to the Ritchie Memorial Camp on Lake
Ashtabula were offered this year and likewise are being
offered for the coming year. Teachers interested in attend-
ing this camp for instruction in soil, water, and wildlife
conservation should make application to the County Super-
intendent of Schools in Cooperstown or to the District of-
fice.

The expenses of the delegates to the 4-H Conservation
Camp at Lake Metigoshee were again paid for this year by
the District.

One tour was conducted jointly with the County Ex-
tension Service. The tour included observation of conserva-
tion practices installed and further practices needed,
crop trials and pasture management.

Each year the National Association of Soil Conserva-
tion Districts sponsors what is known as Soil Stewardship
Sunday by all churches. Last spring a breakfast in honor
of the pastors of the county was held for the purpose of
spearheading the Soil Stewardship programs that were
held during the week of May 26 through June 2.

For the past several years the North Dakota Associa-
tion of Soil Conservation districts, the Implement Dealers,
the Bankers Association, the Press Association, together
with the local Soil Conservation District have sponsored a
Soil Achievement Contest to encourage conservation of our
soil and water among the farmers. One cooperator in each
district is selected as the cooperator who has installed the
most and best conservation practices on his farm. This
does not necessarily mean the best farmstead, although a
good farmstead usually goes along with a good farmer.

The cooperator so selected by the judging committee is
given as an award, a colored picture of his farm. Kermit
Ueland, who farms in Sverdrup Township, was the winner
this year. Art Smogard was second and Joe Zimprich, Jr.,
third.

PIONEER CITIZEN OF GRIGGS COUNTY CALLED BY DEATH

FRITHIOF GREENLAND PASSED AWAY SUDDENLY EARLY SATURDAY MORNING AT HIS RESIDENCE IN BINFORD

Frithiof Greenland, a pioneer of Griggs county, died at his home in Binford, Saturday morning, June 6, between the hours of 1:00 and 4:00 a. m. He was alone when death occurred, which resulted from heart trouble. Up to the day before his death he enjoyed his usual health.

Frithiof Greenland was born in Vestre Toten, Norway, on May 14th, 1850. In 1871 he was married to Natalie Evenrud, also of Vestre Toten, and he immediately thereafter emigrated to America, coming to Austin, Minnesota and later moving to Lanesboro, Minnesota, where they resided for about four years, after which they went on a farm six miles from Fountain, Minnesota, where they resided five years. In 1881 they moved to North Dakota and settled on a farm six miles south of Cooperstown, which he still owned.

In 1890 he was elected Sheriff of Griggs county and moved to Cooperstown when he assumed that office. Previous to that time he had held the office of Assessor for the county, and various township and school offices. He held the office of Sheriff for four years. After his two terms of office had expired, he returned to the farm for a number of years, but returned to Cooperstown and went into the implement business, where he was joined in later years by Nels Lunde and Theodore Kittelson, the business now being conducted under the name of The Greenland-Lunde Company. Mr. Greenland was active in the implement business until he suffered a stroke, after which time he never took any active part.

He moved to Binford in 1917 and lived there until his death.

Deceased is survived by Mrs. Greenland, three sons and one daughter. Three other children, Magda, Minnie and Clara preceded him in death. The children living are Oscar, of Binford, Magnus, of Aneta, Ingval, of Cooperstown, and Nora of Minneapolis. There are 14 grand-children.

Services were held in the Binford church, Monday at 12 o'clock, noon, with Rev. H. O. Bach officiating. The remains were then taken to Cooperstown where services were again held with Rev. Estrem officiating. Interment was made in the family burying lot in the Cooperstown cemetery. The pall bearers were H. P. Hammer, Benjamin Tufte, Martin Ueland, John Oie, P. A. Melgard, and Joseph Buchheit. Business houses of Binford and Cooperstown were closed during the funeral hours.

Mr. Greenland was greatly interested in public affairs and has taken an active part in politics, both of state and nation and was a delegate to state conventions at various times.

He has accumulated a goodly portion of earth's riches, and in addition to the splendid farm south of Cooperstown, and the implement business in Cooperstown, he was a stockholder in the Farmers and Merchants bank of Cooperstown, and interested in a number of smaller enterprises.

He was a man of generous impulses and never forgot the hospitable ways of the pioneer. The stranger, even though a beggar, never failed to find food and shelter if he sought it at his hands, and he was at home by the bedside of the sick and delighted in all kinds of neighborly offices. He had filled the various relations of life, as husband, father, brother, friend, and filled them well. Who can do more?

But he is gone! Another name is stricken from the ever lessening roll of our old settlers, and a solitary woman in the sunset of life, and a lonely home, are left to attest how sadly they will miss him. It must be so; these tender human ties cannot be severed without a pang. Yet in such a death there is really no cause for grief. His life work was done, and well done. He had passed his golden wedding day and wearied with life's duties and cares, weary of suffering and waiting, he lay down to rest.

He was a man who united sound sense with strong convictions, and a

candid, outspoken temper, eminently fitted to mould the rude elements of pioneer society into form and consistency, and aid in raising a high standard of citizenship in our young and growing state. How much this community owes him and such as he, it is impossible to estimate, though it would be a grateful task to trace his influence through some of the more direct channels, to hold him up in these degenerate days, in his various characters of husband and father, of neighbor and friend, to speak of the sons and daughter he has reared to perpetuate his name and emulate his virtues. But it comes not within the scope of this brief article to do so. Suffice it to say, he lived nobly and died peacefully at the advanced age of 72 years. The stern Reaper found him "as a shock of corn, fully ripe for the harvest."

Not for him be our tears! rather let us crown his grave with garlands; few of us will live as long or as well and fewer yet will the Angel of Death greet with such a loving touch.

Mrs. F. Greenland Died Tuesday Eve

Death Came at Home of Son
at Aneta Following Nine
Days' Illness.

Mrs. F. Greenland, widow of one of Grigg's county's pioneer citizens, a former sheriff and one of the best known men in the county a few years ago, passed away at the home of her son, O. M. Greenland in Aneta at about 10:50 Tuesday evening of this week. Death followed but a few days illness, she having been taken sick on Monday morning, January 15th. Death came very quietly and resulted from complications due to her advanced age, being 86 years one month and nine days old at the time of her death.

Mrs. Greenland was born in Norway on December 15, 1841. In 1879 she came to this country with her husband, settling for a year in Minnesota, coming to this county the following year, where she has since made her home. Mr. Greenland was prominent in county affairs in the early days and among other positions of trust held the office of sheriff here for two terms, from 1892 to 1896. He was engaged in several business enterprises and farming in this community.

Lived Here Till 1917

After a few years spent on the farm the family moved to Coopers-town where they resided until 1927, when they moved to Binford, where her husband passed away in 1922. Following the death of her husband she continued to make her home in that village for several years, but a little more than a year ago came to Cooperstown to make her home with her son, Ingval, south of town. About three months ago she left for Aneta to make her home with another son, O. M. Greenland, where she passed away Tuesday evening.

Preceding her in death are her husband, who passed away in 1922, two daughters, Minnie, who died in 1906, and Cara, who died in 1915, and one son, Oscar, who passed away in 1926. Surviving are two sons, O. M. of Aneta and Ingval of Coopers-town, and a daughter, Miss Nora, of San Francisco, Cal., besides fourteen grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been made, pending word from the deceased's daughter in San Francisco, though it is thought that it will be held Saturday. There will be two services, one from the Greenland home in Aneta and the other at the Lutheran church in this city in the afternoon at two o'clock. Burial will be made in the family plot in the Cooperstown cemetery.

Mrs. Gabrielson, Binford, Is Dead

Settled on Land Later Platted
as Townsite for Village
of Binford.

Mrs. Gabrielson, who came to this county as a pioneer in the middle 80's and settled with her family on the site where Binford is now located, died last Friday. Funeral services were held Tuesday at the Binford Lutheran Free church.

Mrs. Gabrielson, 88 years and 8 months old at the time of her death, was born in Valestrand-Sveens, Preste Jeld, Norway, May 8, 1848. In 1872, at the age of 24, she came to America and made her home in Wisconsin. The following year she was united in marriage to Gabriel Gabrielson.

Moved to Minnesota

Three years later they moved to Minnesota and settled near Brooten, where the family remained for eleven years and where all the children who survive their mother were born.

In 1886 the family came to North Dakota and settled on the plot of land on which Binford now stands. From there they moved north to make their permanent home on the farm now occupied by the eldest son, Swen Gilbertson.

Five of the nine children are living. They are Swen Gilbertson, Gilbert Gilbertson, Mrs. John Pederson, Mrs. Anton Miller and Mrs. Fred Oien. Mr. Gabrielson died 29 years ago.

There are 26 grandchildren and 22 great grandchildren.

Lived With Daughter

During the last few years Mrs. Gabrielson has made her home with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John Pederson. She suffered a stroke which caused her death last Friday.

Rev. I. Norum officiated at the services. Rev. O. Swenson also spoke.

The pall bearers were grandsons: George Gilbertson, Palmer Pederson, Henry Miller, Elmer Miller, George Oien and Frank Oien.

Mrs. Oscar Greenland, well-known resident of Binford passed away at her home in that village on Monday morning. Heart trouble caused death while she was sleeping and it was not known that she had passed away until 6 o'clock in the morning when she was found by her daughter, Miss Helen Greenland.

Funeral services are to be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Trinity Lutheran church in Binford.

Death Is Sudden

The death came as a shock to the family and community since Mrs. Greenland had not been seriously ill even the evening before her passing.

Bertha Greenland was born January 4, 1881, near Pigeon Falls, Wis. With her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Lier, she moved to near Cooperstown in May, 1899.

She was married to Oscar Greenland April 19, 1900, at the Greenland home south of Cooperstown. They moved to Binford to establish their home where Mr. Greenland was engaged in the hardware business and banking.

From the time Mrs. Greenland came to Binford she took an active part in all community life, especially church work. She and her husband were charter members of the Trinity Lutheran church. She was one of the first members of the Ladies Aid of that church and held various offices.

Member of Rebeccas

From the time the Wild Rose chapter of the Rebecca Lodge was established in Binford, Mrs. Greenland was a member.

Mr. Greenland and a son, Mansfield, preceded her in death. She is survived by eight daughters and three grandchildren. Her daughters are: Mrs. C. C. Ehlers, Kellogg, Idaho; Florence and Blanche, Binford; Mrs. R. J. Bohrer, Stanton, N. D.; Berniece, Mrs. Carl Swenson, Dorothy and Hellen Marie, Binford. Her father M. C. Lier, Mose; three brothers, Ludvig, McHenry; Joseph, Mose; and Christ, McHenry, and one sister, Mrs. Walter Gratias, Seattle, also survive.

Mr. Greenland has been a resident of this county all his life, being the youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frithjof Greenland, prominent Griggs county pioneers. He was born on the farm which he has operated for years, located in Ball Hill township south of Cooperstown.

Surviving are the widow and four children: Viola, Forrest, Truman and Eugene, all at home. One brother, Magnus, of Aneta also survives, as well as a sister, Nora, of Seattle, Wash.

FORMER COOPERSTOWN MERCHANT DIES AT ANETA

Magnus Greenland of Aneta, former Griggs county resident, was buried Wednesday following services at Aneta. He died Sunday after ailing for some time.

Coming to Griggs county with his parents in the early '80s, Mr. Greenland was associated with C. T. Widten General store in Cooperstown until after the turn of the century. From here he went to Minneapolis and to Aneta where he has been in general merchandising the last 33 years. Mr. Greenland was a prominent figure in Aneta civic life.

Born May 12, 1875, at Sanesboro, Minn., he grew to manhood in Sverdrup township. He attended Griggs county schools and later the Red River Valley university at Wahpeton. He married Hattie Saxrud in 1906.

Besides Mrs. Greenland, he leaves three children, Phyllis of Valley City, Mrs. Glenn C. Lee, Excelsior Springs, Mo., and Maxwell of Aneta, and one sister, Nora Greenland of Seattle, Wash.

Former Resident Near Walum Dies

Word was received in the county last week of the death of Gunder A. Gunderson, former resident near Walum and at the time of his death a resident of Modesto, Calif. He died at his home May 25 after suffering from leakage of the heart for three years.

Funeral services were held May 27 and interment was in the family plot in the Citizens cemetery.

Mr. Gunderson was born June 22, 1864, in Telemarken, Norway. He came to the United States with his parents at the age of five years. They settled in St. Croix county, Wisconsin.

While yet a young boy he came with his father to North Dakota and they took a homestead where is now the townsite of Walum. In 1890 he was married to Ida Larson and to them six children were born. A baby girl died at their home near Walum, and a son, Ira, was killed in an accident ten years ago near their home in Modesto.

In 1915 he went to California with his family and has remained there since that time.

GRIGGS PIONEER PASSED AWAY ON FRIDAY MORNING

Knut Holland Called at Age of
67 at Home West of
Binford.

CAME TO GRIGGS IN 1881

Paralysis, Cause of Death,
Suffered for Less Than
a Week.

Death's call to Knute Holland, long time Griggs county resident, was answered by that fine old gentleman last Friday morning at eleven o'clock at his farm home four miles west of Binford. Paralysis was the immediate cause of death, Mr. Holland suffering the stroke starting at nine o'clock on the Sunday evening previous to his death. Funeral services were held Sunday.

Mr. Holland had not been well for the past twenty years, pneumonia a score of years ago leaving him in such health that has led him to other climes. But during his long residence in Griggs county, which dates from the early eighties, he had proven himself a very useful citizen, a fine neighbor, and a most considerate husband and father of ten children. All the children with his widow, survive Mr. Holland and will ever cherish his memory.

Funeral services were held at the home of the deceased at eleven o'clock Sunday morning and at the Westley church, in Sverdrup township, at three o'clock in the afternoon, burial taking place in the cemetery there. Rev. Halling of Binford and Rev. Sletta of the Westley church officiated at the services, which were very largely attended, bespeaking the regard in which Knute Holland was held in every community in which he had been resident in this county.

Knut Holland was born in Hoi-land, Stavanger, Norway, on April 13 1855, having reached his 67th year before his call to the Great Beyond. Since that return the Holland family has resided in the immediate vicinity of Cooperstown except for their removal to the farm home west of Binford about one year ago.

The passing of Knut Holland marks the first sorrow by death in his large family. Besides his widow and ten children he is survived by a brother, Hans Holland of Coopers-town, and two sisters, Mrs. Martin Ueland, of this city, and Mrs. Peterson, who resides in Norway. Goodman Estate Soon to Pass To N. D. Treasury

Griggs Man Who Died 20 Years Ago Left No Heirs Mabel Real Estate

The state of North Dakota will shortly be enriched by some \$4,000 and three quarters of a section of farm land in Griggs county, if the heirs of George W. Goodman, Mabel township resident who died 20 years ago, remain in obscurity.

The estate, including the west half of section 15 and the northeast quarter of section 16 in Mabel township, will escheat to the state under the laws of North Dakota within a short time, according to records made public recently by the state treasurer's office.

For more than two decades, a search for Goodman's heirs has been in constant progress, but none have been discovered. The estate is the largest ever left by persons without heirs and is one of many held "in trust" by the state treasurer.

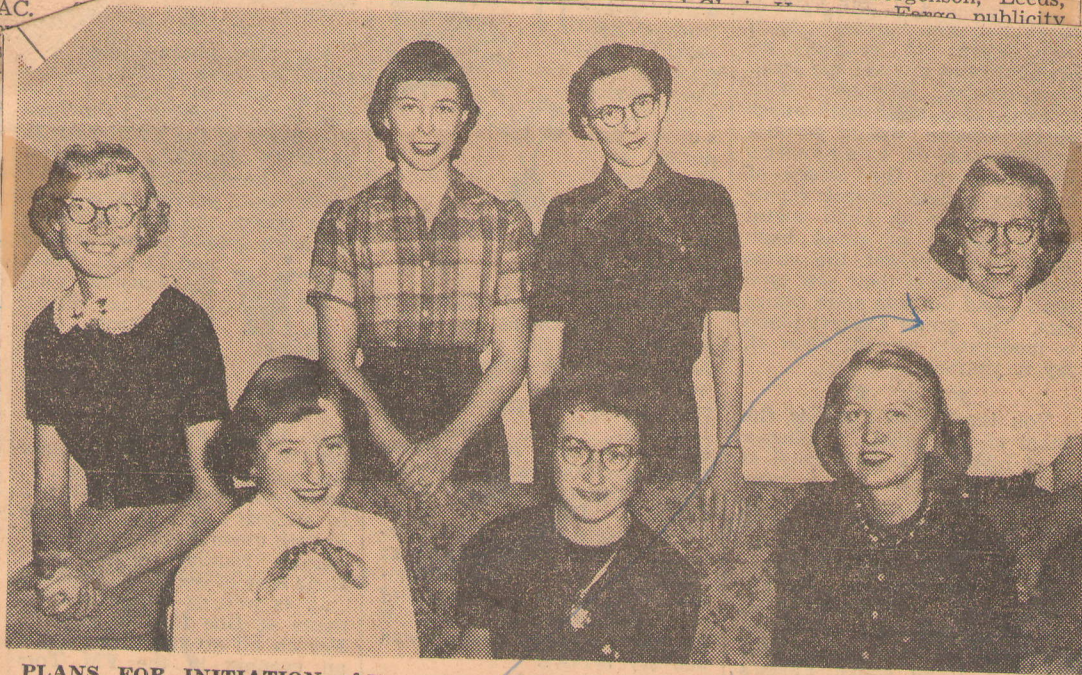
Theories offered locally suggested that the inability to locate heirs of the estate might be due to a change in name. Apparently Goodman came to Griggs county from unknown parts seeking a new start in life. That he got it and made good is a matter of record.

County officials here indicated an inclination to favor the hypothesis that Goodman's name was not Goodman at all; that a new name may have been part of the new start.

Despite the relatively few estates of more than \$1,000 reports from the state treasurer's office indicated that it is constantly receiving letters from many parts of the world; from relatives seeking lost kin; from attorneys seeking to profit by handling of the estate; from other attorneys representing clients who have been told of a "rich estate in North Dakota."

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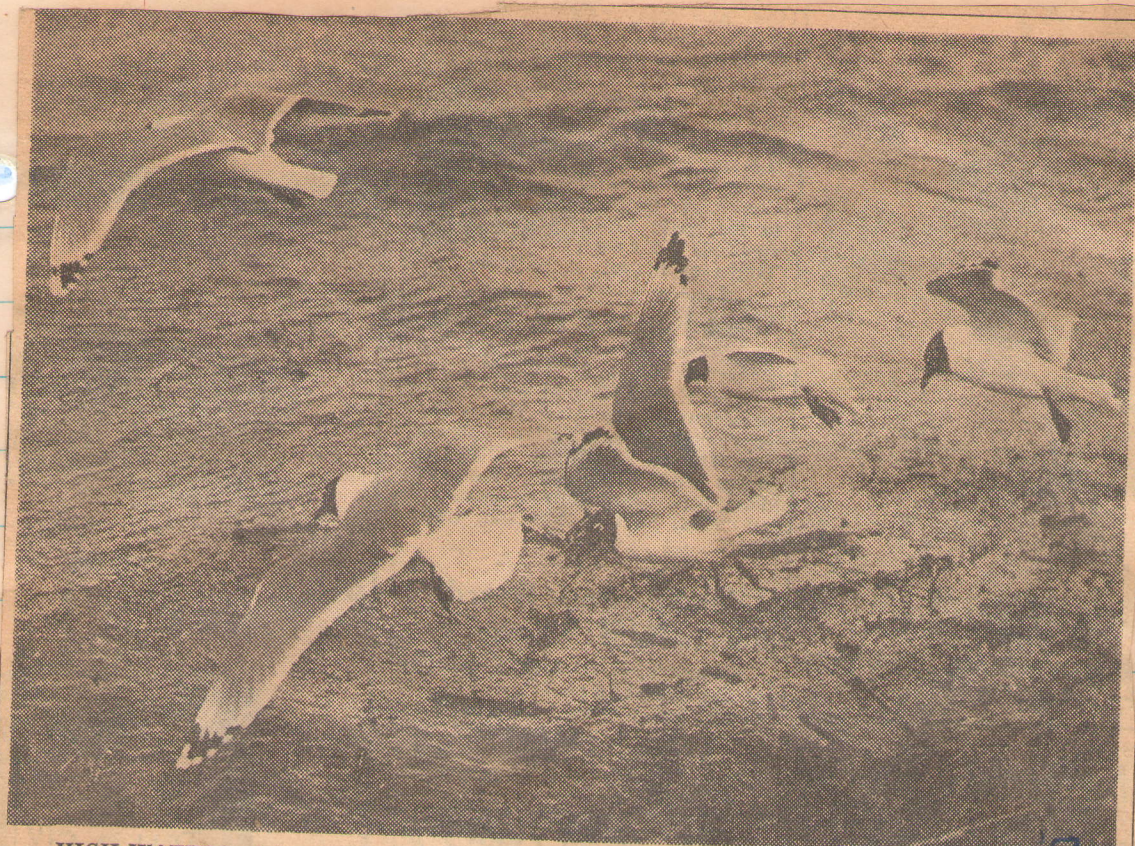

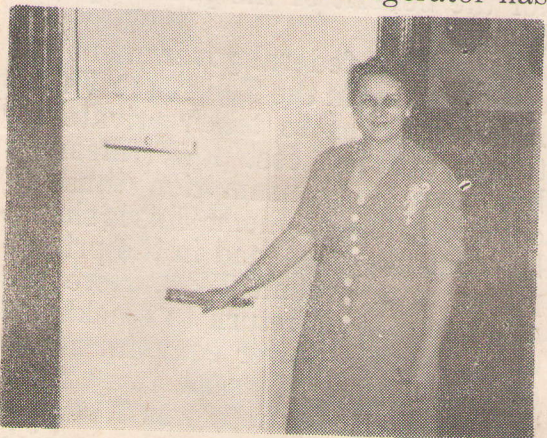

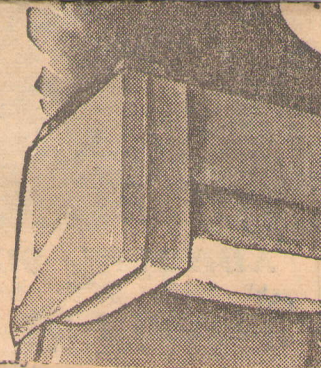

Mr. Gregory was a member of Modern Woodmen of America.

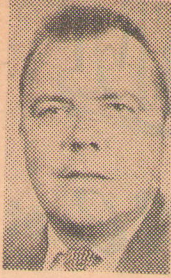

Germans Interested In U.S. Life, Says Former N. D. Man

The German people are genuinely interested in all phases of life in the United States and what is taking place here. Orville Goplen, formerly of Hannaford, N. D., made that statement while visiting in the Fargo Forum editorial office where he formerly was employed.

He is stationed at Coblenz, Germany where he is in charge of the United States Information Agency office. Mr. and Mrs. Goplen and their twin sons, Richard and John, have been visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Goplen of Han-

naford before leaving for Portland, Ore., their former home.

The 1938 NDAC graduate has been stationed overseas in U.S. information work for eight years—2½ years in Oslo, Norway, 2½ years in Reykjavik, Iceland, and the remainder of the time at Coblenz.

It was in Reykjavik that he and Mrs. Goplen adopted their twin sons when they were infants. They are now 4½ years old.

Goplen is the only American in the Coblenz office where he has 20 Germans working with him.

The United States foreign policy is probably of the greatest interest to the Germans, Goplen said. He added that West Germany is probably one of the strongest allies the United States has now.

With West Germany a member of NATO, he said the people there are very interested in the way President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles view world problems. Whatever action the U. S. takes will affect the Germans, Goplen said.

The information agency office in Coblenz has visitors of all walks of life.

"We encourage participation in our programs of students, teachers and other opinion leaders of communities," he said.

The agency has an information center, film and book libraries and exhibits of life in the United States, Goplen said. The office also stages concerts and speaking programs in Coblenz and towns surrounding that city.

The agency also has a branch library at Trier, about 100 miles from Coblenz.

A bookmobile and a circulating

library of about 10,000 American books translated into German operates out of Coblenz into the rural areas.

Mrs. Goplen is the former Esther Nelson of Britton, S. D. They have been in North Dakota since May 3 and they will sail from New York June 14 to return to Coblenz.

It is Goplen's first visit to North Dakota in about three years.

He worked in the Fargo Forum editorial department while attending NDAC. After graduation in 1938, Goplen operated weekly newspapers in Washington and worked for a Portland advertising agency, and the state travel bureau. He was in the Army 3½ years.

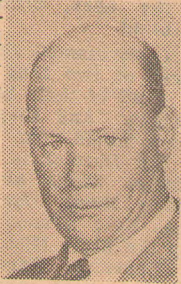

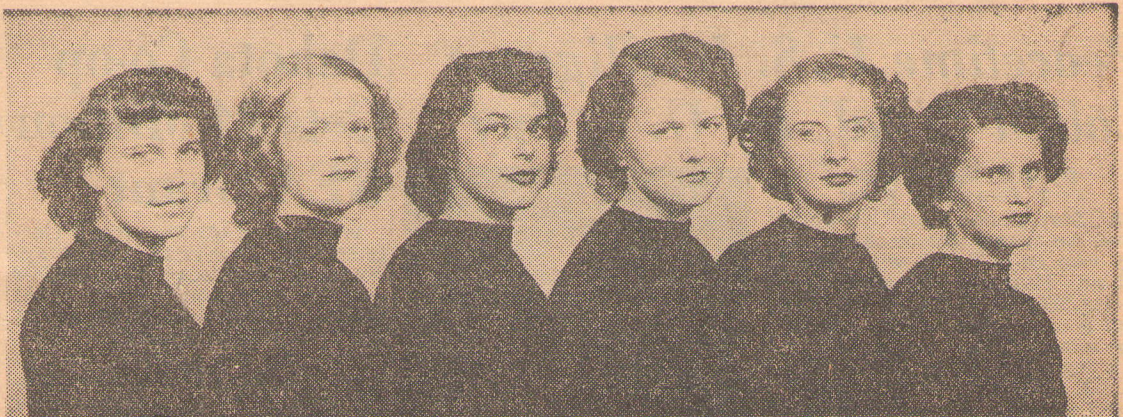

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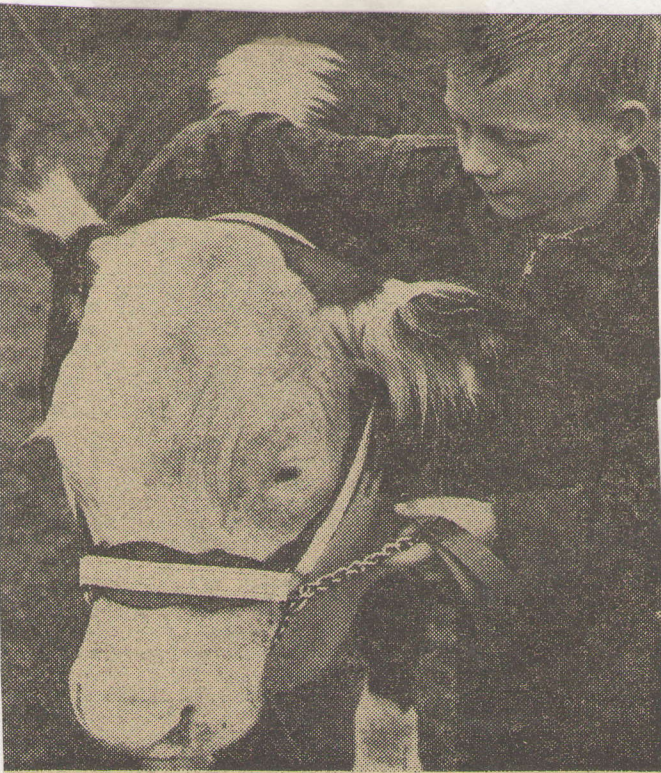
Griggs 4-H Stock Sale Results 1959

Griggs Groups Evaluate '57 Storm Losses

COOPERSTOWN, N. D. (Special)—An estimated 125 buildings were damaged by storms in Griggs County this summer, A. C. Brown, vice president of the Security State Bank of Hamford, said at a meeting here of representatives of several agricultural, county, lending and welfare groups.

The meeting had been called at the request of Gov. John E. Davis, to determine storm losses and to inform storm victims of available aid.

An estimate by County Extension Agent Victor Legler of 50-60 buildings damaged or flattened by the storm was considered low.

The area of total hail loss was outlined as extending from south of Sutton in the southwestern corner of the county to the Sheyenne River, which cuts across the northeastern corner.

The group went on record as requesting that sufficient emergency loan funds be provided by

the Farmers Home Administration to meet all loaning needs coming under its authority.

(John R. McClung of Bismarck, director of the state FHA, said in Fargo several weeks ago that the FHA has sufficient funds at present to handle such loans.)

The group concluded that determining loan needs in the area is difficult now because many farmers have not taken inventory of their situation.

* * *

Two bankers said they expect many farmers to need loans for buying all their seed and for next spring's production expenses.

Henry Herigstad, of the county

ASC, said obtaining feed from the Commodity Credit Corp. surpluses would be difficult.

"While there is a provision for allowing farmers to buy grain going out of condition, there is no grain in the county that would qualify for that designation," he said.

James Hazard, also of the ASC, suggested farmers buy corn and other feed direct from the owner to avoid red tape, and he suggested that cheap corn might be available in Richland County, North Dakota.

A. L. Peterson, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, called the meeting.

Mrs. Goplen was lying in her nightclothes in bed, while Goplen, was lying on the bed fully dress-ed as if he had toppled over, Quam said.

Despite their age, they had been in apparent good health, the cor-oner said.

Investigating with Quam was Sheriff W. C. Haerter.

Cooperstown is some 65 miles west and 35 miles north of Fargo.

Funeral service for Mr. and Mrs. Goplen will be at 2 Saturday in Trinity Lutheran Church, the Rev. A. Palmer Tidemann offi-ciating.

Mr. Goplen was born Aug. 8, 1878, in Goodhue County, Minn. Mrs. Goplen, the former Laura Bakke, was born June 17, 1879, in Norway.

They were married at Coopers-town in February, 1913 and farmed near Binford until moving into Cooperstown in 1948.

They leave a son, Arnie, on the home farm at Binford and two grandchildren.
