Charity Work So Of Local Group

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Mrs. Lucy J. Hall, supervisor at the North Dakota Children's home is grateful for that helping hand. For the Charity circle at present, has one project—keeping the mending done for the children's home. There are approximately 40 healthy, active girls and boys in the home. That means lots and lots of stockings to mend, hems to put up and knees to patch. The staff of the home gets as much of the machine mending done in spare moments as possible, but there is much other work to do and clothes just keep wearing out and getting torn. Thus each month, the staff workers greet the delegate from the UCT Charity circle with open arms and a full box of mending.

Voted unanimously as "the hardest worker among us," by those attending this month's sewing bee was Mrs. Mathilda Blix. She doesn't confine her efforts to the once-a-month gatherings. If there's mending to do after that, it's usually Mrs. Blix who takes it home, her fellow workers agree. She also has a little project of her own—making aprons from remnants, to be sold or given away by the circle.

Mrs. Josephine Hartman became a member of the circle in 1918, the same year Mrs. Blix began her work. Ready to reminisce with these two about projects of the past was Mrs. Emil Glaser, only charter member of the UCT auxiliary present at the October meeting. Mrs. Glaser and Mrs. R. E. Cole are the only two charter members remaining in Fargo.

There are only six others who have been in the auxiliary for over 30 years, two of whom have moved out of Fargo but still retain their membership here. They are Mrs. P. J. Tierney of Glide, Ore. and Mrs. I. G. Towne of Portland, Ore. The four in Fargo are Mrs. Earl Nees, Mrs. Estella Lundsten, Mrs. Anna Thorsell and Mrs. J. J. Hannaher.

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started making appeals for assistance in knitting and sewing, the auxiliary's Charity circle was organized. At that time, the UCT had its lodge rooms in the Moose hall, now the Eagle hall, and the women moved sewing machines into the hall and settled down to Red Cross quotas. They met once a week through the war.

When there was no longer need for Red Cross sewing, the women, interested in maintaining the satisfactory relationship which had formed over their knitting and sewing, looked about for another project. The North Dakota Children's home and the Charity circle began their partnership then and it has continued through the years.

While about 25 to 30 women consistently attend the sewing circle, a project which was an outgrowth of the Charity circle's activities touches all 150 members of the auxiliary. That is the packing and distributing of Christmas baskets. The entire auxiliary contributes jams, jellies, canned foods and baked goods for the baskets. The collection which is taken each month at the Charity circle meeting is supplemented from the auxiliary treasury. Along with the food and candy the women put in a few toys. They try to get a mental picture of the family which will receive the basket, then if there is a special need, they can help fill it. Often, a dress of other reconconditioned garment is found pressed and festive in with the Christmas dinner.

But that's just once a year. At other times the North Dakota children's home receives the wholehearted attention of the group. It is seldom any expenditure of money is involved, but as Mrs. Hall gratefully says, in this case service counts more than money. In addition to the mending, the circle sometimes gets a call for making extra items — materials supplied by the home. One year, it was 100 bibs.

Incidentally, while the circle brings its own "findings" thread, needles, tape, etc., the home supplies the patches. There's no problem — members have discovered pieces from garments they mended months before in the pile of patches. No garment or piece of garment goes to waste there. But the women are proud of being able to help the home keep its reputation for sending its children out looking as well cared for as any other child.

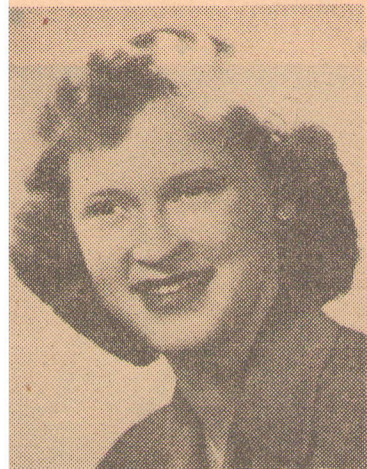

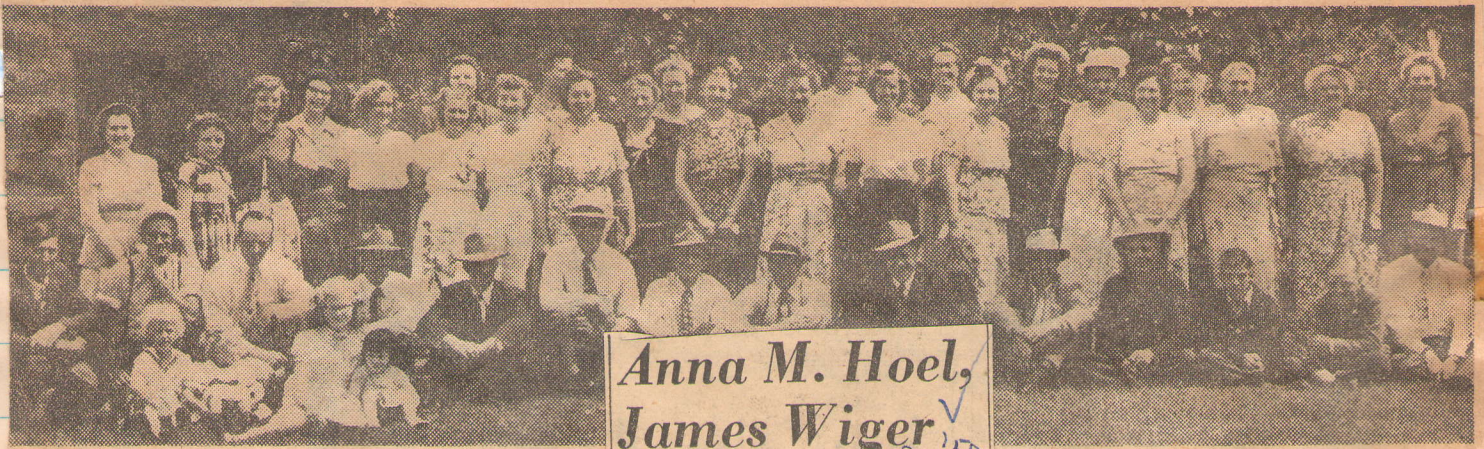

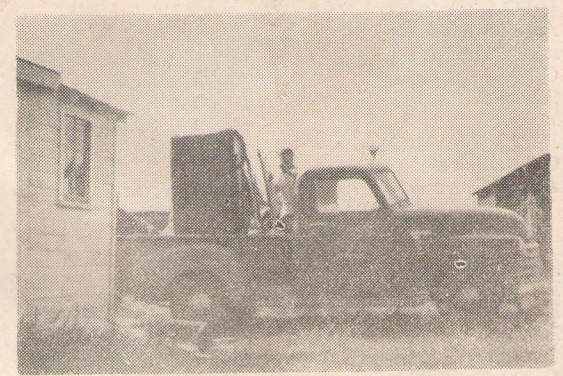

 Orders Prophecy Search By Priests, Scribes, of His Possible Overthrow

Jerusalem, Dec. 26.—Beginning the Year of Our Lord 1917.—An apprehension was marked on the anxious faces, and is soon disturbed as to the name of the miraculous birth of Jesus in Bethlehem.

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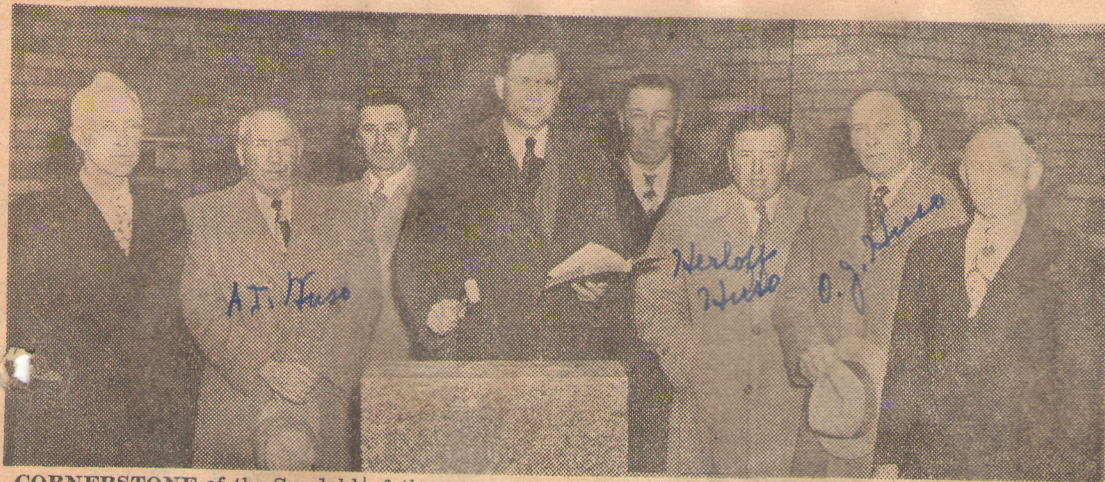

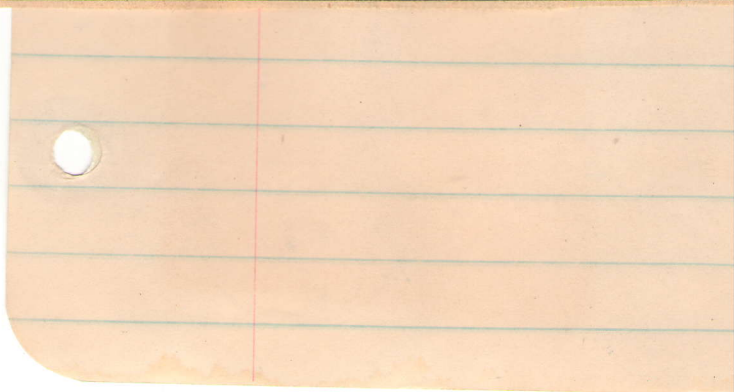

Mrs. Etho Husel Instantly Killed in Farm Accident

Meets Death While Helping
Husband and Son Saw
Wood at Farm.

Funeral Held on Tuesday

Leaves Husband and Three
Sons to Mourn Over
Tragic Passing.

A tragedy which prostrated members of her family and shocked the entire county occurred at the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Etho Husel last Saturday when Mrs. Husel was instantly killed while helping her husband and son saw wood with a circle saw. Mrs. Husel was struck in three places with parts of the broken saw blade, one part striking her in the forehead and cutting a fatal gash down across her face and neck. Another piece struck her in the chest while the third caused a gapping wound in her arm.

Mrs. Husel had been assisting her husband, who had been ailing, with farm work during the morning. Part of the morning was spent in grinding feed, following which they decided to saw into stove lengths several fallen trees. The three were engaged in this work and had sawed two of the timbers.

Examines Saw

Believing that the saw was not functioning properly Mr. Husel stopped the machinery and made a thorough inspection of it, testing the boxes for tightness, the shaft, etc. Everything seemed in good order and two more trees were sawed and then the third tree was lifted to the saw. Less than three inches into the wood the saw broke, the shattered pieces striking Mrs. Husel, causing her instantaneous death. Mr. Husel saw her fall, stopped the machinery and rushed to town for a physician. Death had been instantaneous, however.

Funeral services were held in the Presbyterian church in Cooperstown, in which deceased was an ardent worker, on Tuesday of this week with Rev. D. D. Jansen of Jamestown officiating, after short services had been held from the home. Burial was made in the Cooperstown cemetery. Pall bearers were Ed Zimprich, M. E. Wilkinson, Carl Kruschwitz, Geo. H. Johnston, Alfred Retzlaff and Matt Bendickson.

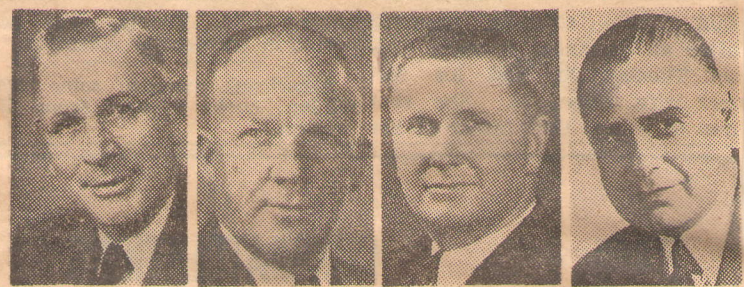
