COOPERSTOWN, N. D. — Funeral service for Arne C. Heukaas, 73, of Cooperstown, who was killed Wednesday when he fell into a well he was cleaning, will be at 2 Saturday in Trinity Lutheran Church. The accident occurred on the Wallace Smith farm in Steele County three miles south of Aneta.

George Strand, Steele County sheriff, said Heukaas, who had been in the well drilling business in the area for many years, fell to the bottom of the 53-foot well.

He said Heukaas had been to the bottom of the shaft and had climbed back to the top when he slipped head first into the opening.

The Aneta fire department was summoned and a fireman climbed down and fastened a rope around Heukaas' legs. The man was dead when brought to the surface.

Elmer Gilbertson, Steele County coroner, said death was accidental and there would be no inquest.

Aneta is some 65 miles north and 40 miles west of Fargo.

Mr. Heukaas was born Jan. 9, 1882, in Hardanger, Norway, and came to this area in the early 1900s. He married Edna Olson in December, 1945.

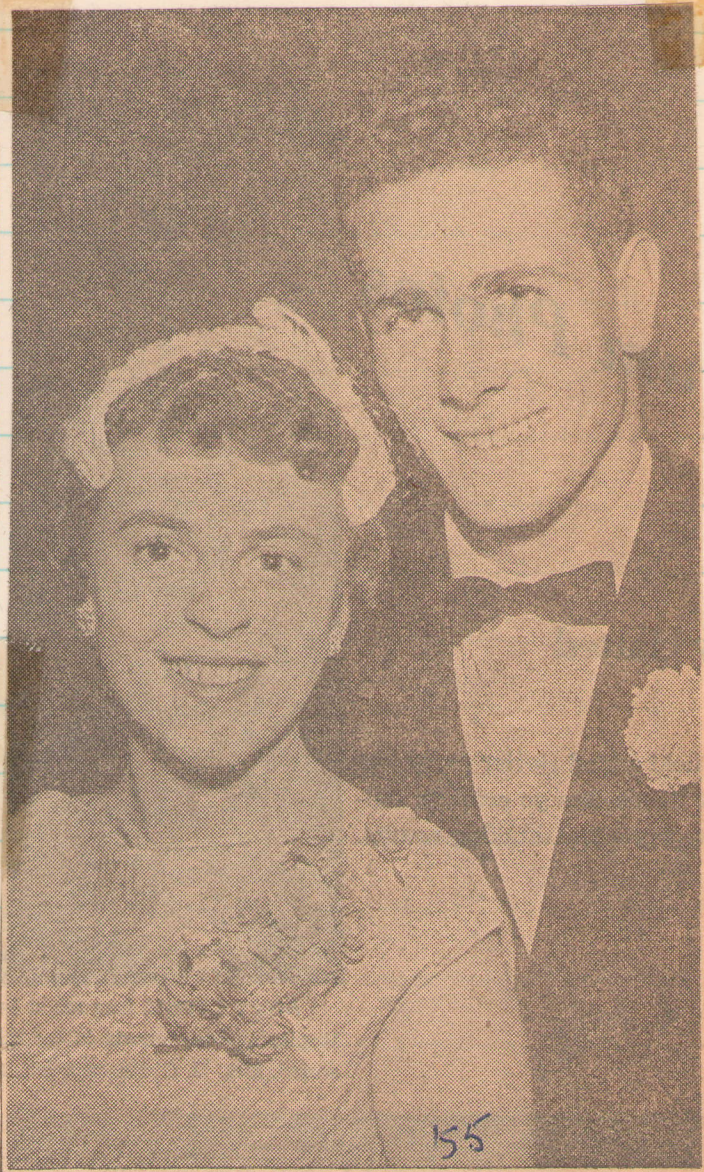

Hutchinson Held In High Regard By Bench

Wahpeton Jurist Modeled Career On Pattern Of Boyhood Idol, The Great

Judge William H. Hutchinson, the Wahpeton jurist who is retiring after nearly 27 years on the district court bench, is a one-time farm boy who hitched his wagon to a star.

He dreamed of emulating another farm boy, John Marshall, the great chief justice of the United States.

While he did not reach the U. S. Supreme Court bench, he became one of North Dakota's most distinguished district judges. On many occasions he was called to fill in on the state Supreme Court bench.

After one of his decisions on his own bench was reversed by the high court, that body granted a re-hearing and reversed itself to affirm his findings.

He has ruled on many complicated issues of importance to the welfare of the state and individual citizens. Some of his decisions are law in the state.

Upon hearing of his retirement, Judge John C. Pollock of Fargo said he was expressing a universal opinion when he said Judge Hutchinson is held in high regard by the North Dakota bench and bar.

Vincent Bald, the court reporter who has served him 17 years, views him with a regard akin to worship.

Hutchinson Born In Alexandria

Judge Hutchinson was born in Alexandria, Minn., July 24, 1882. His father was Charles I. Hutchinson—school teacher, grain buyer, homesteader and later hardware dealer. His mother was Sarah G. Clauson. They were natives of Wisconsin.

His father came to Grand Rapids in LaMoure County as a grain buyer. The year was 1885. The N. P. built its railroad through the area that year. Mrs. Hutchinson and the children came in 1886.

The father filed on a homestead, six miles north of Grand Rapids, which was occupied in the summer. Winters were spent in Grand Rapids until 1889, when the family moved permanently to the farm.

In 1902, when the father became county register of deeds, he sold the land, bought a hardware store and the family settled in the county seat of LaMoure. Later he started a harness and heating and plumbing business.

The father was active in local affairs. He taught school and held township and school offices. He served as postmaster and mayor. He was in the North Dakota Legislature at its first session, as chief billing clerk.

The parents became parents of six boys and six girls, and were keenly interested in their education. The first rural school in the area was opened in the Hutchinson home. The 11 Hutchinson children who reached maturity received college educations.

of the study of his life and his famous Supreme Court decisions grew an admiration that still continues.

"He became my hero," said Judge Hutchinson. "I thought he had a great mind. I was impressed by his opinions and the manner in which he prepared them."

In 1916, when A. J. Beveridge's four-volume "Life of John Marshall" came off the press, Judge Hutchinson, then a practicing lawyer for nine years, fondly renewed his acquaintance with his hero.

In 1933 during the farm depression when the judge handed down his noted opinion rejecting Gov. William Langer's mortgage foreclosure moratorium, he relied strongly on Marshall's theories.

Judge Hutchinson said in effect that government and principles of government are not for good times only.

He said, "Principles cannot be prostituted because we have a depression. They must stand regardless of the situation. The stability of government depends on it."

When the North Dakota Holiday Assn. attacked his decision and began circulating recall petitions the situation attracted national attention.

Public opinion held he was right and the Holiday association, finding it difficult to get signatures on the petitions dropped the plan.

Started Practice Of Law At LaMoure

Hutchinson enjoyed a good practice in LaMoure after being ad-

was comparatively small. The approximately \$4,000 was considerably less than an active lawyer might earn in normal practice.

Emulated Marshall In His Decisions

In many ways Judge Hutchinson emulated John Marshall. His decisions were models of directness and simplicity. They showed an ability to get directly to the core of an issue.

In other ways he has shown his admiration for Marshall. He has been free from pomp, air of office or studied effect. He has shown a benignity and good humor. He has demonstrated a reverence for religion and a devotion to family.

Like Marshall too, he has been a nature lover. He likes nothing better than to tramp through the woods, a diversion he frequently pursues when at his summer cottage on Lake Stewart, near Clitherall, Minn.

He once said, "I suppose I like the woods because I was brought up on the prairie. A tree is almost sacred to me."

While in LaMoure he aided in establishing the first park board and took an important role in beautifying the city with trees and shrubs.

He took the lead in creating the county Memorial Park at Grand Rapids, one of the first county parks established as a soldiers memorial in North Dakota.

He made his vegetable garden and rose culture his personal hobby at his home in Wahpeton.

known for the wisdom of his decisions and for his courage in meting justice to high and low.

Decision In N. P. Case Was Notable

One of his notable decision was announced April 13, 1940. In a suit brought by the Northern Pacific Railroad against the State of North Dakota involving \$20 millions in tax values, he ruled in favor of the state.

Judge Hutchinson heard a staggering volume of testimony, pored over many pages of complicated documentary evidence and studied applicable state laws.

He came to the conclusion that the state is permitted to use "a reasonable judgment and discretion" and is not bound by specific rules in determining values. He held a court cannot substitute its judgment for that of the state.

Other decisions of Judge Hutchinson which drew attention and probably set patterns included these rulings:

That the City of Ellendale had discretionary powers and could limit its liquor licenses to a benefit association and refuse to renew licenses held by private liquor dealers.

That the state dairy commissioner was wrong in contending that a creamery company was guilty of unfair discrimination in paying higher prices for butterfat at one point than another, having disregarded transportation and handling costs.

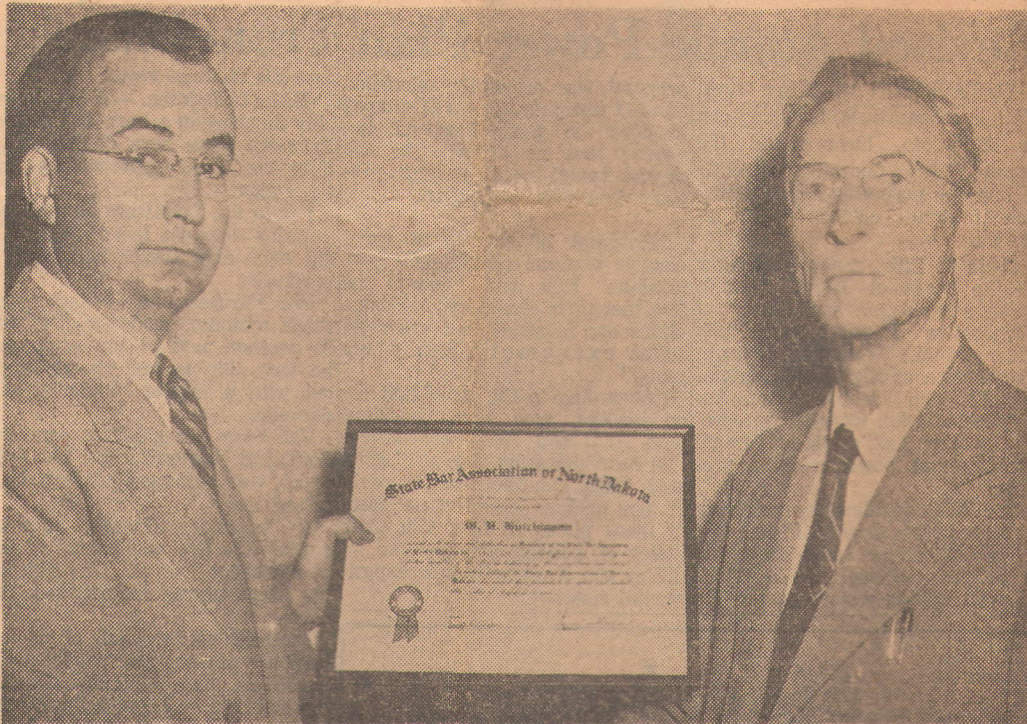

Like all Normal graduates of the time he received a life teacher's certificate, and when he entered the University of North Dakota was given a year's credit on an arts degree.

Showed Interest In Government

In the university law school he manifested his special interest in government by taking three courses on the early government of the United States.

He studied nearly every significant speech made in Congress from the beginning of the nation and up to the Civil War. He studied each congressman, his community, background, the reasons for his statements and his influence on the early development of the government.

It was during this period that he became intensely fascinated with the noted John Marshall. Out

Started Practice Of Law At LaMoure

Hutchinson enjoyed a good practice in LaMoure after being admitted to the bar in 1907. He served as city attorney and for six years as president of the board of education.

He was selected by Gov. L. B. Hanna about 1914 as a member of the board of trustees of the state university. He was only 32. Serving with him were two other notable North Dakota lawyers, N. C. Young of Fargo and Tracy Bangs of Grand Forks.

In 1916 he was chosen state's attorney of LaMoure County, a position he was still holding when elevated to the bench in 1929. In 1932 he was elected president of the State Bar Assn.

In 1936, North Dakota Masons chose him as their grand master. St. Felix Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine, named him its sovereign. The previous year Mrs. Hutchinson had been elected president of the North Dakota P. E. O. Sisterhood.

In more recent times, Judge Hutchinson has been a national director of the American Judicature Society, a committeeman of the American Bar Assn.

When he was elevated to the bench by Gov. George Shafer, he took with him his youthful ideals.

Explaining his feelings on one occasion, he said:

"There is something in the nature of man that makes him want to put his ideas or ideals into practice. I think the motivating sentiment in my mind when I went on the bench was to see certain ideals of the profession carried out. I tried to do it."

If there is any off-the-bench enterprise in which the judge takes particular pride it is the war activities committee in LaMoure County he formed and led during World War I. He was too young to serve in the Spanish-American War, too old for World War I.

At the end of the war, the committee found itself with a surplus. Hutchinson suggested it be invested in a park, a memorial to the soldiers who gave their lives in the war.

Fifty acres of timber land making up an old picnic ground near Grand Rapids were acquired. An auditorium was built. In the early days chautauquas were conducted annually.

Lecturers included such figures as William Jennings Bryan, William Howard Taft and Billy Sunday.

The memorial park is still a going concern and is kept up as in the past.

point than another, having disregarded transportation and handling costs.

Judge Hutchinson has not escaped reversals but his instructions to juries and his rulings on admissibility of evidence have never been questioned.

On the whole, reversals have not disturbed his equilibrium. He has felt that he had done his best and that his responsibility had ended.

One Of First To Use Pre-Trial Conference

He probably was one of the first judges in the state to inaugurate pre-trial conferences as a means of clarifying issues, eliminating non-essentials and speeding litigation through the courts.

The plan is now provided by law.

Unknown to few but intimate friends, Judge Hutchinson reached a crisis in his life at the time of his most important criminal trial. It was in the winter of 1948-49. He faced total loss of vision as he was approaching the end of his career.

Few knew that he had gone through life with vision in only one eye. The sight in one member was destroyed in some manner in childhood.

Shortly before the time for the trial at Wahpeton of August Pusch and Lydia Witt for the poison murder of Mrs. Pusch, he was trying a will contest in Rugby.

A cataract had developed in the good eye. He could undergo surgery, but could he be sure of the result?

Harassed by thoughts of spending the rest of his life in darkness he went on with the most important and most-publicized trial in his life, the Pusch case.

After the trial, the judge pursued his ordinary duties as best he could. He continued to hesitate over the question of surgery until he was virtually blind. Later in 1952 he submitted to an operation.

The cataract removal was successful.

Judge Enjoys Society Of His Fellows

Judge Hutchinson is a Rotarian and enjoys the society of his fellows. He found on taking the bench that he would meet large numbers of citizens.

He said he would not have enjoyed being confined to a supreme or appellate court. It would have cut off his contacts with people.

What has impressed Judge Hutchinson most is the weight of responsibility and power given by the people to its district judges. He feels the post is one of the most important in government, to the people.

To commit men and boys to prison and training school has been his most unpleasant task.

"It was a case of having to do what you had to do," he said.

He pointed out that although 100,000 people live in his district, composed of Dickey, Emmons, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh, Ransom, Richland and Sargent counties, there were only seven homicides

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Judge Hutchinson has not been improvident of the years. He goes into retirement with provision for the rest of his days.

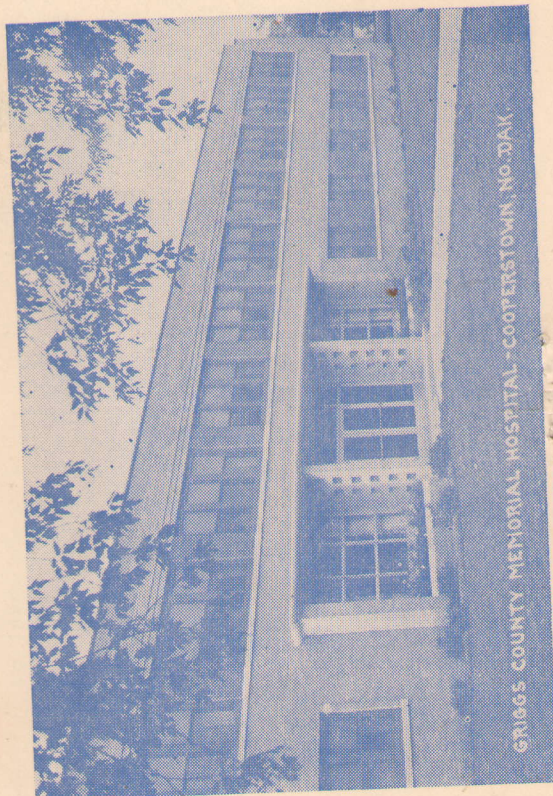

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Please Pay Your Hospital Bill Now, Asks Hospital Board

Mrs. Robert Mack, superintendent of Griggs County Hospital, said this week that unless the people owing hospital bills start paying up, the hospital will have difficulty meeting its operating expenses.

She stated "the needs of the Griggs County hospital are vital and necessary. Our main aim and wish is to be able to give you the best and most up to date service possible when you need us most. Our reward is not monetary, as you know, but in the ability to serve the community with joy and gratification. And unless our financial straits can be coped with we will have to start asking for down payments on all admissions. This is your hospital as well as ours. Please help us make it one we are justly and rightly proud of."

She quoted from a recent issue of Health in the News, a monthly publication, in explanation of the cost of hospital service.

"Many people have the impression that hospitals make money out of dispensing hospital service. Because operating costs are high, hospital rates are also high. A patient or a patient's relative who has had to dig down deep to pay a hospital bill can easily persuade himself that somebody has taken a neat profit on his hospital stay.

"But proof that such an impression is wrong can be found in an American Hospital Association publication recently released. Computed on a nationwide basis, the figures prove

that voluntary non-profit hospitals spend more money caring for the average patient than they collect for that care.

"In 1952, hospitals in the United States classified as 'general and special non-profit short term hospitals' numbered 2,973. For each patient day of service these hospitals received an average of \$18.10 from the patient while spending an average of \$19.55 for that patient's care. The total loss in 1952 was nearly 140 million dollars.

"These voluntary, non-profit hospitals (all North Dakota hospitals fall in this category, except state institutions) can stand this loss only by cultivating other sources of income, such as endowments, gifts, rentals, or other activities.

"The AHA figures show further that of every dollar hospitals accumulated from such sources as endowments in 1952, 90 cents benefited hospitalized patients and a dime went for debt retirement, purchase of equipment, or perhaps the extension of a needed service that could not pay its own way.

"In fewers words, the voluntary non-profit hospitals do not make a profit on their charges to patients—on the contrary, they dig up \$139,777,000 to help pay the costs of patient service.

"And on top of that, they must raise \$281,240,000 in the immediate future to expand and improve present facilities to meet increased demands for hospital service."

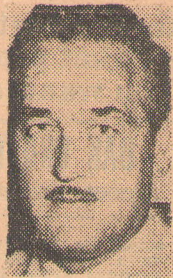

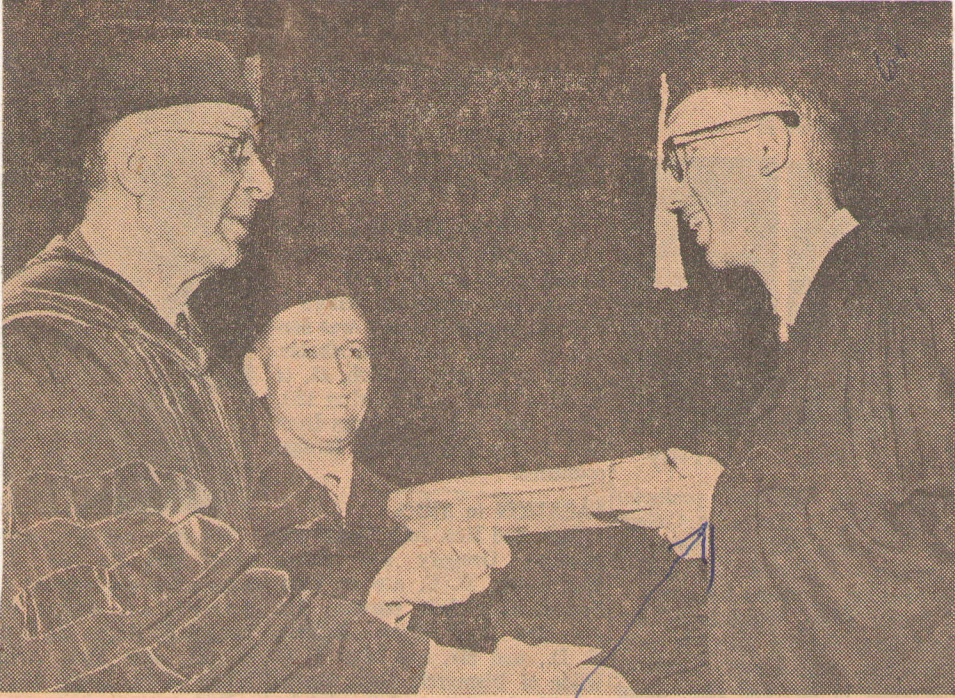

Hannaford To Extend Water, Sewer System ⁵⁸

HANNAFORD, N. D. (Special) —Work has started here on an addition to the village water and sewer system.

A water and sewage system was installed on the main street in 1956. The present job will bring water service to about 24 city blocks and sewage service to about 30 blocks.

Involved are construction of water mains, a 50,000 gallon overhead water storage tank, sewer laterals, sewer force mains, a sewer lift station containing two 200-gallon per minute pumps, and a lagoon-type sewage disposal system.

W. H. Noel Construction Co. of Jamestown, N. D., has the \$20,815 job of installing water mains. Ted W. Welk of Bismarck received the contract for installing the water tank, with a bid of \$23,010.

Smith Construction Co., Grand Forks, N. D., got the contract for the lift station and concrete work with a \$33,555 bid, and Abbott Arne and Schwindt, a Moorhead firm, received the contract for installing the sewer laterals and the sewer force main with a bid of \$45,398.55.

The project will be completed next summer, Kenneth Stennes village clerk, said.

The water tank was purchased in Bismarck. It had been on the Capitol grounds there, and was sold after the city of Bismarck extended water mains to the Capitol.

The lagoon-type disposal system will be installed on the outskirts of town. Hannaford received an 18,000 federal grant to help finance the lagoon and lift station. The remainder of the work is financed by \$54,000 in warrants sold locally and \$101,000 sold to the bank of North Dakota.

Hannaford is about 35 miles north and west of Valley City.

Roy Johnson—The Fargo Forum-Daily News historical writer reminded me that one time we did a story about Frank Jay Haynes, an early-day photographer, who once had his studio in the building which the Hauser Meat Market was later to occupy.

Sure enough, the abstract in the hands of A. M. Cornwall, president of Northwestern Mutual, shows that the property at 8th Street and Main Avenue (Lots 11 and 12, Block 7, Original Town-site) was sold on Jan. 11, 1879, by Patrick Dowd to Haynes for \$800.

And on May 19, 1890, the abstract says, the property was sold by Frank J. and Lilly V. Haynes to William Hauser (apparently a brother of John) for \$5,300.

Northwestern Mutual in 1957 purchased three lots on the corner, Lots 10, 11 and 12, for about \$70,000.

Now Frank Jay Haynes, in case you don't know, was probably the most famous photographer in these parts in those days. He established a studio in Moorhead in 1876 and in 1880 moved to Fargo, where he built the frame two-story building at 8th and Main.

He was quite a boy. He made trips to the West Coast before the railroad was built west of the Missouri—taking pictures. He became famous as a photographer of scenes in Yellowstone National Park.

He was official photographer with President Chester A. Arthur and Gen. Phil Sheridan on a tour of the park in 1883. He took pictures of the ceremonies marking the driving of the Golden Spike at Garrison, Mont. on Sept. 8, 1883, and later was official photographer for the Northern Pacific Railroad for 20 years.

Haynes established the first Palace Studio Car in the world on the NP, taking photos from Chicago to Puget Sound and published the first Official Guide Book of Yellowstone Park.

In 1889 he moved his family to St. Paul, where he established a studio, and he died March 10, 1921.

So next spring Northwestern Mutual will build a new home on the old Hauser Meat Market site at 8th and Main.

Shades of the old butcher boy!
