



Sanford L. Johnson Dies as Result of Shooting Accident

Funeral Services Conducted from Home and Church on Saturday.

Killed by Revolver Shot

Fatal Accident Occurred at Vasfaret Farm Near Blabon Thursday.

Fatally injured by the accidental discharge of a revolver which he was carrying, Samford Leo Johnson, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Severson of Cooperstown, died last Thursday afternoon while enroute in a car to a Valley City hospital.

The accident occurred shortly before noon at the Halgrim Vasfaret farm four miles east of Blabon, where Samford and a companion, Adolph Holm, also of this city, had been staying. The two boys had gone into the pasture east of the farm buildings shortly before dinner to bring in some horses. The horses had been rounded up and brought back to the barn, but Samford, who had taken a little 22 calibre revolver along, remained to shoot gophers. When he failed to return Adolph returned to the pasture to close the gate. It was then that the young man's body was discovered lying close to the fence.

The revolver was lying beside the body, with only the one bullet discharged. It is evident that the gun had just been re-loaded, and it is possible that difficulty in closing the gun after it had been "broken" had caused its accidental discharge. The bullet struck just above the eye and penetrated the brain. The accident was discovered about 11:30, only a few minutes after it could possibly have occurred.

A physician and his step-father, George M. Severson, left Cooperstown as soon as notified of the accident and left at once with the young man for Valley City to be cared for in the hospital. Shortly before reaching Valley City, however, he passed away.

Funeral services were conducted from the home and from the Presbyterian church last Saturday afternoon, Dr. L. C. Cooley, pastor of the church officiating. Interment was made in the Cooperstown cemetery.

Samford is survived by his mother, Mrs. George M. Severson, his step-father, one brother, Russell, two sisters, Helen and Jessie, and his grandfather, D. A. Root. His father, Peter Johnson, died eight years ago.

Samford Leo Johnson was born in Cooperstown on July 23, 1910, and has made Cooperstown his home practically all of his life. He attended the local schools and was a member of the Methodist Sunday school.

Besides his grief-stricken relatives he leaves a large circle of young friends and companions who mourn the tragic passing and abrupt ending of the young man's life.

Funeral Services For Arnt Johnson To Be Held Today

Sverdrup Township Farmer Died Suddenly at His Home Last Sunday

Arnt Johnson, 57, Sverdrup township farmer, died suddenly at his home southeast of Cooperstown last Sunday. Funeral services will be held this afternoon at the Westley church. Rev. Gilbert Stenoi is to officiate.

Mr. Johnson first came to Griggs county in 1892 and worked as a farm hand. In 1910 he purchased land near the Sheyenne river in Sverdrup township and established the home at which he was living at the time of his death.

Born at Stavanger, Norway, January 30, 1876, Mr. Johnson came to America at the age of 16. Twice he returned to Norway for visits to his old home. The first was in 1900. In 1908 he again went back and remained there for two years.

On March 19, 1910, he was united in marriage to Talets Berge and set out May 10 for America this time buying the Sverdrup farm.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson have eight children, all living. They are Martin, Arthur, Edwin, Bjerne, Borghild, Clarence, Clifford and Lenner.

Pioneer Lady Is Called To Final Resting Tuesday

Funeral Services For Mrs. John Johnson Engen On Saturday

Amidst the Christmas season the tidings of death and life come to the home of John Johnson Engen of this city with the death of Mrs. Johnson who had been suffering from illness over a period of five months.

Funeral services will be held Saturday and the remains will be laid to rest in the Sheyenne Valley cemetery. The services at the home will begin at 11 o'clock and at the church at 1 o'clock.

Born in Minnesota

Mrs. Johnson was born in Lien county, Minnesota, May 20, 1869. Her mother died at her birth. At the age of eleven years she came with her father to a homestead. There she resided until her marriage in 1888 to John Johnson Engen.

Mrs. Johnson, a pioneer in Griggs county, was 62 years, seven months and five days of age at the time of her death.

Ten Survivors

Ten children were born to this union. Two children preceded the mother in death. Besides her husband the children surviving are Bertha, Joseph, Ernest and Albert, all residing near Cooperstown; Mrs. J. O. Amundson, Ryder, N. D.; Mrs. T. J. Huso, Aneta; Mrs. M. E. Hjelseth, Carrington, and Oliver Johnson, Reynolds, N. D.

Cooperstown, N. D.—John E. Johnson, 71, Cooperstown, died Thursday in a Sharon hospital. Born Oct. 5, 1875, in Trondjem, Norway, he came here in 1908. Survivors are Mrs. Johnson, the former Hermina Olson, whom he married in Norway, and a son, Hjalmar, Cooperstown. Services will be in the Lutheran church here, Rev. H. J. Hanson officiating, at a date to be set. The S. J. Quam funeral home is in charge.

Rev. Josephson Taken By Death

Served As Pastor in Saron
Church for Period of
13 Years

Telegraphic news was received here this week advising relatives and friends of the death of Rev. H. J. Josephson, formerly of this city, in Pasadena, Calif., last Monday morning. Funeral services were scheduled for this afternoon.

Rev. Josephson served as pastor of the Saron church southeast of this city from 1903 to 1916 while his work in Cooperstown was instrumental in the development of the Bethlehem church of this city.

Upon leaving Cooperstown he was engaged for a time in editing the "Evangelist," a publication distributed from Chicago. About ten years ago ill health came upon him and he was forced to transfer his residence to Colorado, from where, after a number of years stay, he removed to Pasadena.

Two daughters of the deceased reside in Griggs county. They are Mrs. Conrad Herigstad and Mrs. Henry Herigstad, who reside south of Cooperstown.

Edward Johnson Died at Home in Romness Sunday

Was Resident of Griggs County
for Period of Nearly
Fifty Years.

Edward M. Johnson, 57, a resident of Romness township for nearly 50 years, died at his farm home there last Friday morning from the effects of a paralytic stroke suffered about a year ago.

Funeral services were conducted from the Ringsaker Lutheran church in Romness on Sunday afternoon with one of the largest crowds of friends and neighbors ever gathered there, present for the rites. The Rev. G. R. Estrem of Cooperstown officiated at the services and interment was in the Ringsaker cemetery.

Youth Dies After Extended Illness

Clinton Jackson Is Laid To
Rest with Services
On Sunday

Funeral services for Clinton Jackson, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Jackson of Hannaford, were held in the Lutheran church of Hannaford Sunday, June 16, Rev. E. O. Lee officiating.

Since his sophomore year in high school he had been suffering from continued illness which increased in severity as years passed. Last November he suffered a relapse in the form of a paralytic stroke from which he recovered slowly. Tuesday, June 11, he was stricken for a second time and was unable to regain consciousness except for brief moments. He died Thursday, June 13.

Clinton Jackson was born March 30, 1916, at Fargo, and was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran church. As a student in the Hannaford schools previous to his illness he had been an honor student while participating in many community activities.

Funeral rites for Christian Jackson, Griggs county pioneer who passed away Tuesday of last week, were held 2 o'clock last Thursday in the Sutton M. E. church. Rev. I. O. Jacobson, Cooperstown, officiated.

Mr. Jackson, 83 years old, had been in good health and comparatively active until two weeks before his death when he suffered a heart ailment, which caused his death.

He was born December 13, 1849 in Vestre Toten, Norway, and immigrated to the United States in 1871. He settled at Coon Prairie, Wis., and remained there until 1882 when he came to Griggs county.

Mr. Jackson filed a homestead in Mabel township where he resided until a few years ago. At that time he made his home with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. James Bailey.

He was married in 1890 to Ingeborg Vesta at Cooperstown. She passed away August 12, 1916.

Surviving are four children, John Jackson, Mrs. A. M. Starr and Mrs. James Bailey, all of Sutton, and Melvin Jackson of Minneapolis. Four brothers also remain. They are Ole of Sparta, Wis.; Martin of Cashton, Wis.; Matt of Westby, Wis., and Claus Jackson of Hannaford.

Mr. Jackson was a charter member of the Mabel Lutheran church. Burial was made in the cemetery of this church.

Pall bearers were Adolph Kje'son, Anton Christopherson, Johan Christianson, Oscar Kjelson, Ole Anderson and Ben Howden.

Car-Truck Crash Takes Life Of Young Mother

The first accident fatality of 1946 in this vicinity occurred last Monday when Mrs. Virgil Jensen was fatally injured about 10:00 a. m. when the car in which she was riding with her husband and two sons was involved in a collision with a truck on a hill top on Highway No. 7 about 8 miles west of Finley.

Arvid Hanson of Finley, was the first autoist to appear on the scene of the crash and took the injured family to Cooperstown, from where Mrs. Jensen was taken to Fargo by Arnold Skofstad. She died while en route to the hospital. Mr. Jensen suffered a possible fractured back and two broken ribs. The boys, Jerry 4, and Dennis 2, were bruised and shaken up.

Driver of the truck was Reynold Retzlaff, farmer near Cooperstown, who suffered cuts about the knee.

Witnesses of the smashed vehicles stated that as Mr. Jensen was coming over the top of the hill he first saw the truck and in applying his brakes skidded sideways directly into the truck, pushing in the side of the car so that the steering wheel touched the right hand side of the body. The front end of the truck was damaged.

Mrs. Jensen, 25, was the daughter of Paul Richford of near Jessie. Her mother died Jan. 2 from a heart attack.

Besides her husband and two little sons, Mrs. Jensen leaves her father and four brothers. She was born April 8, 1920, on a farm near Jessie and was married to Virgil Jensen Sept. 20, 1940 at Valley City.

J. E. Johnson, Resident of County 43 Years. Dead

Prominent Citizen Died Here Suddenly About Noon Monday

Funeral Services Today

Came to Town From Lee Nearly 43 Years

Funeral services for J. E. Johnson, pioneer citizen of Griggs and Nelson counties and a resident of Cooperstown for nearly 43 years, are being held from the Lutheran church here this afternoon. Mr. Johnson died shortly before noon Monday while reading a newspaper in the office of the local Crane Johnson company, paralysis of the brain being given as the cause.

The death of Mr. Johnson marks the passing of one who has long been identified with the business and civic life of Cooperstown and Griggs county. Homesteading near the now abandoned town of Lee, in Nelson county, in 1861, he has since been a citizen of this community.

Born in Norway

Mr. Johnson was born in Hardanger, Norway, on March 29, 1855, and came to Cooperstown about 1885 after living on his homestead near Lee for several years. Shortly after moving to this place he became associated with Maynard Crane in the Crane-Johnson Lumber company.

Although no longer taking an active part in the management, Mr. Johnson still held his interests in the company. The concern operates yards in Cooperstown, McHenry, Jessie, Sutton, Juanita, Hannaford, Karnak, and Fairmont, North Dakota, and Rosholt, Lake City and Hillhead, South Dakota. Head offices have been in Fargo for the last several years.

Death Came Suddenly

Apparently in his usual health Monday morning, Mr. Johnson was downtown and shortly before noon went to the office of the Crane-Johnson company here. Seating himself in a chair he began to read a newspaper while several others in the office went out into the yards. Returning a few minutes later they found him slumped in his chair, seemingly asleep. An attempt to wake him disclosed that he was ill and he died a few moments later.

Surviving him are Carl S. Johnson, Zahl, N. D., a son, and Mrs. F. A. Blocker, Shreveport, La., a daughter. Mrs. Johnson died several years ago.

The funeral services are being held from the Lutheran church beginning at two o'clock this afternoon with the Rev. G. R. Estrem officiating. Pallbearers, all early friends and neighbors of Mr. Johnson are: E. M. Ayrea, Lewis Berg, P. A. Melgard, H. P. Hammer, Marsar Cussons, and E. S. Hamilton. Interment will be in the Cooperstown

Surviving besides her husband and three children are an aged mother, Mrs. Inger Gilbertson of Highland, Minn., three step children, six brothers and one sister.

John F. Johnson Dies On Tuesday

Septuagenarian Passes Away From Cancer; Services To Be Friday

John F. Johnson, 74, who has lived in Griggs and Steele county since 1882, died Tuesday morning at 12:50 a. m. from complications of cancer following an attack last fall. Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. S. Sydness in the Ness church tomorrow.

John F. Johnson was born in Ness in Hallingdal, Norway, on April 5, 1862. He lived in Norway until he was 18 years old when he emigrated to America and settled in Ward county in Iowa. In the spring of 1882 he came up to the Sheyenne river east of Cooperstown and in 1883 he homesteaded on a farm in Willow Lake township, Steele county, 12 miles west of Hope, where he lived until 1890 when he moved back to Washburn township in Griggs county. Later he bought the land on the east side of the Sheyenne river on which he lived until 1933. He was on the township board of Washburn for 12 or 15 years and was road boss for a number of years.

Only one relative of his is known, Ole Skreen, Ulen, Minn. He has a number of distant relations living near Lake Mills, Ia.

Ole Jacobson, Dover Pioneer, Died Oct. 10

Ole Jacobson, one of the pioneer residents of Dover township, died suddenly last Thursday afternoon of heart failure. Death came without warning to his family or friends. On the previous Sunday Mr. Jacobson had complained of not feeling well, but his illness was attributed to rheumatism. During the day he had gone about his tasks as usual.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from Eidfjord Lutheran church and burial made in the cemetery at that place.

One of County's Earliest Pioneers Dies in Romness

Griggs county is again called upon to mourn the loss of one of its earliest pioneers, in the passing of Mrs. Barbara Johnson, whose death occurred at her home in Romness township, six miles north of Cooperstown, last Saturday afternoon, July 15th. Death came after a short illness from bowel trouble, and until the Wednesday preceding her taking she appeared in her usual good health. Her death was a great shock to the many friends of the family and the gathering and floral tributes presented at the funeral service attested to the esteem and friendship in which she was held.

Barbara Haugen was born in Sigdal, Norway, on April 15, 1852, being at the time of and 3 months old company with her to this country, Grove, Minn., where she lived for about a year, then moving to Spring Grove, Minn., where she lived until her death. Her home at Fargo came to Griggs county where she took up her abode, which since that time has been her home.

On January 1, 1881, she was united in marriage to Peter Haugen, and to this union were born four of her children. Her husband passed away on October 1, 1917. Her son, John, died on October 1, 1917, the effects of the influenza epidemic. Her brother, with whom she came to this country, died here on October 1, 1917.

Surviving her children are Mrs. Peter Zentz and Olaf Johnson, of Fargo, Minn., and Mrs. H. E. Ely; two nephews, Torgerson and his brother and sister, Norway, and eight grandchildren. Her son and three daughters were all at her bedside at the time of her death.

Funeral services were held at the Ringsaker Lutheran church in Romness on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Essen delivering the funeral sermon, paying high tribute to the life and character of the deceased. She was one of the real pioneers of Griggs county, taking up her homestead in Romness long before the coming of railroads in this section of the county. The experiences of pioneer life and her Christian character alike were influences in building up the esteem and love in which her friends held her. Her passing leaves a large void in the community in which she made her home, but her friends and family retain the tenderest of memories to assuage the grief of her leaving. She was a member of the Ringsaker Lutheran church since its foundation, and in her quiet way was always an ardent worker.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful, and reflected her position of esteem of her friends. Clarence Jacobson, baritone with the Manitou Concert company sang at the services. Interment was made in the family lot in the Ringsaker cemetery.

Her husband preceded her in death, passing away on the farm in Romness on October 23, 1911. A son, John, died on October 21, 1918, from the effects of the flu, at the age of 25 years. 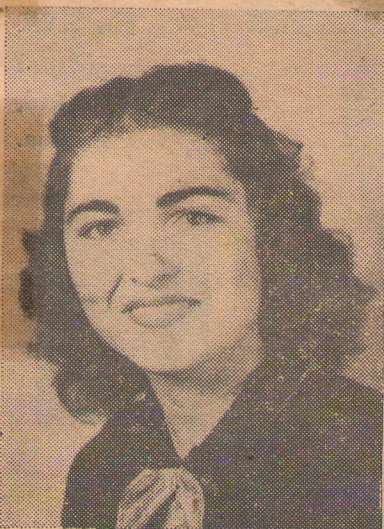

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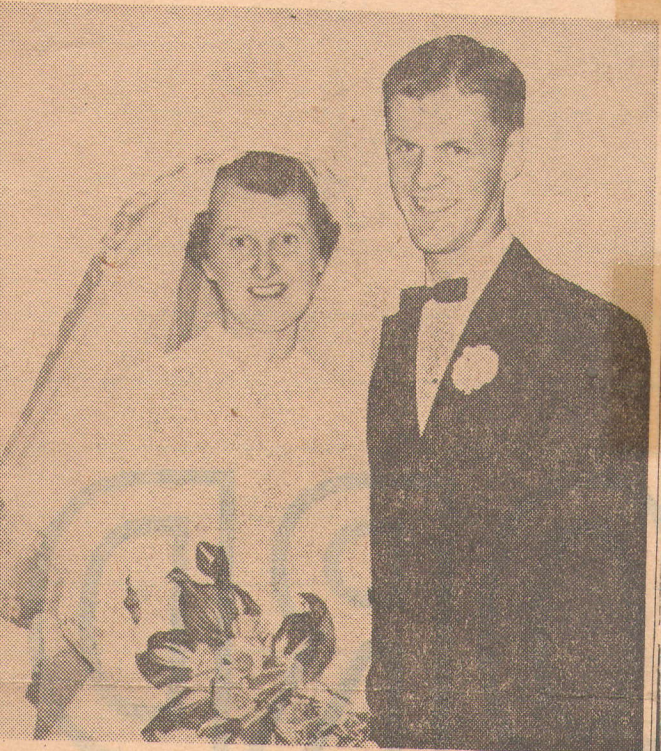

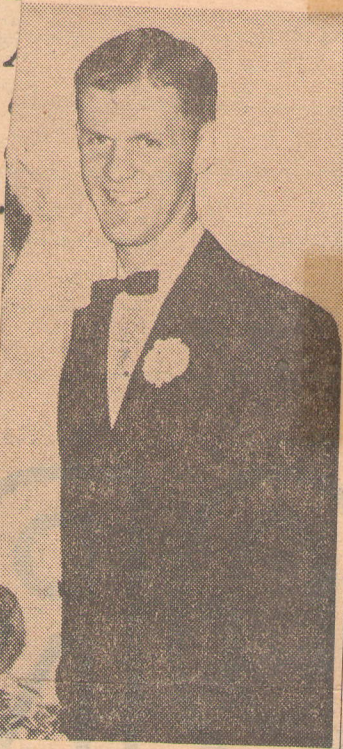

N. D. Man Credits Prayer For Escape From Leopard

Howard Johnson, a former Cooperstown, N. D., resident and now a missionary of the Evangelical Free Church in India, wrote the following article from his hospital bed following an encounter with a leopard.

Johnson has been in India five years, is married and has two children. He attended Cooperstown High School, Trinity Bible School, Minneapolis, and Moody Bible Institute, Chicago. A World War II veteran, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Johnson, Cooperstown. He still is hospitalized.

The article was written for a missionary magazine and was entitled, "Two Duds and a Prayer."

"Sahib, come and kill a leopard," begged the caretaker of the forest bungalow where we were staying.

The day was January 14, and our family was "camping"—living temporarily in a rural district of western India, where I was preaching.

"One man has already been bitten, and he needs medical attention right away," he told me.

When I returned from driving the injured man to our mission dispensary, I was informed that the man-eater's back had been broken, which would make shooting it an easy job. This information later proved to be false; only his hind paw had been injured.

I started up through the thick brush to hunt the beast, but before I realized he was near, the animal came roaring with lightning speed toward me. I pulled the trigger of my gun, but the cartridge failed to go off! Another instant and the leopard was on me. Before I knew what was happening, he had knocked the gun out of my hands, too far away for me to recover it.

Then we began hand-to-paw fighting. The man-eater slashed out with his paw and gashed my hand badly. By that time I knew it was a "kill or die" struggle and I had to keep my head to win.

We fell to the ground and I tried to roll toward the gun. Meanwhile

I got the leopard's head between my legs and attempted a real squeeze, but the beast freed himself. By that time he had cut a deep gash near my eye and had nearly disabled one of my legs. With God's help I shoved the animal into the brush, picked up my gun with one hand, and fired. What an awful consternation to find that the bullet was a dud! It failed to go off.

The leopard, roaring with pain and rage, prepared himself for a final attack. In desperation I cried to the Lord for help, and He heard my prayer. I threw another bullet into the chamber, pulled the trigger, and the man-eater fell to the ground dead.

By this time I was bleeding a great deal. I called to the 30 or 40 villagers who had gathered at a safe distance to watch the battle. Because they were afraid the leopard was still alive, they refused to move at first, but after a little persuasion came over to me. They helped make a tourniquet out of my handkerchief to stop the flow of blood from my hand, and applied pressure on the wound near my eye.

I put the leopard, which measured 78 inches from nose to tail, in my truck. Since no one else could drive, I then drove myself 20 miles to the Nasik hospital, where I received stitching and medical treatment.

As I write this from my hospital bed, it is with the knowledge that I'm living today only by the grace of God. My heart goes out in love and gratitude to Him for sparing my life. I would not have gone after the beast, but I wanted to save the lives of others.

2 Fargo Couples Tour Europe, Visit Relatives In Scandinavia

A. I. Johnson, Norwegian vice consul in Fargo, and Mrs. Johnson have returned after a four months European tour with Mr. and Mrs. J. Emil Carlson, 812 Broadway.

They visited Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, France, Switzerland, Belgium, Holland and England, and returned with the impression that on the whole, these countries have made substantial recovery following the war.

Johnson's most pleasing experiences were the visits he made to the birthplace of his parents in the mountain valleys of the Telemarken area of Norway and to places in Germany and France where he served in the U. S. Army during World War I.

Mrs. Johnson looks back with pleasure to her visit in Stavanger where her mother was born, while the Carlsons made the most of their stay in Sweden, the home of their ancestors.

Johnson declared that even in a four months visit abroad it is futile for a visitor to expect to come back with an accurate picture of the economic and political situation in any country.

He noted a number of things, however, such as stores stocked with fine merchandise almost everywhere, factory chimneys belching smoke, modern farm equipment and crops that looked bountiful.

"Norwegians want American automobiles, refrigerators and wash machines badly but they find the duty too high," he said.

He found the bustling cities of Oslo, Bergen, Trondheim and Stavanger much like American cities but the visit to the mountain valleys of Telemarken revealed another world.

Travel in that area was via the narrow Norwegian mountain bus, which is manned by men who know everybody and perform errands for the people along the route, and who transport freight and mail along with passengers.

"The Norwegian mountain bus may not be much to look at but it is a great socializing instrument in that rocky country," he said. "It travels along narrow, precipitous roads and unites the people."

He said he found little wealth among the rural people, still there was no poverty either. The economy was based on timbering, dairying and cheese-making, and residents augmented their earnings in timber cutting and transportation.

During their stay in the mountains, the Johnsons ate home-canned meat, multe and tutti berries, dairy products, bread which was hard and seemed unleavened, "atrocious" coffee and excellent tea.

"All over Europe the country coffee is very strong and unpalatable to Americans," he said.

* * *

Johnson was surprised to find the childhood homes of his parents still standing and occupied by kinfolk. He met 13 first-cousins and Mrs. Johnson 10 second-cousins.

At Oslo the Johnsons were

guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hans Olav, who have since left for Helsinki, Finland, where Olav has become Norwegian ambassador.

Olav is well known in Fargo. He accompanied the Norwegian crown prince and princess and Einar Gerhardsen, the Norse prime minister here as a press and public relations representative.

In Stockholm, the Johnsons met Gerhardsen and talked with him a few moments. He was hurrying to an international conference.

Johnson met the Norwegian foreign minister and other foreign office officials with whom he corresponds regularly as vice consul for North Dakota.

Traveling through Sweden, he was surprised to note the great pine forests virtually covering the land.

At the junction of the Rhine and Moselle rivers in Germany, Johnson re-photographed a spot he had first put on film in 1919. It was the site of the gigantic statue of Kaiser Wilhelm on a horse, only this time the statue and horse were missing, having been knocked off by American artillery or bombs.

In Germany there was much activity along the Rhine and in the Ruhr valley, and the autobahns were crowded with hurrying buses, trucks and automobiles.

Speaking to a high Norwegian official, Johnson learned that the Norwegian government has considerable confidence in Adenauer and the present regime in Germany.

Johnson took many photographs in color, which have been made into slides for future viewing.

Another 'First' On Record Of Cooperstown Jet Pilot

1952

A former Cooperstown, N. D., man, Lt. Col. Richard L. Johnson, has added another "first" to his record as a jet pilot with the U. S. Air Force.

He is credited with being the first man ever to cause the recorded phenomenon of sound "explosion" during a flight over Dayton, Ohio.

He is the same man who, in 1948, set a new world speed record of 670.98 miles per hour in an F-86 jet fighter.

An article in "The Bee-Hive," house organ of the United Aircraft Corporation, tells how the sound "explosion" occurred.

At 12:41 p. m., one day, what sounded like a sharp thunderclap startled residents of Dallas, Texas. The police headquarters switchboard lit up "like a Christmas tree."

Investigation disclosed that the "culprit" was a colonel, vice commander of the Air Force flight test center at Edwards Air Force Base, Edwards, Calif. The colonel readily admitted responsibility for the "explosion" and said it had been done deliberately.

Then, while a deputy sheriff was questioning the colonel another "blast" occurred. This time "the perpetrator was identified as Lt. Col. Richard L. Johnson."

The two officers explained that they had put their Chance Vought Cutlass planes into a high speed dive, then pulled out. The shock waves built up during the dive continued on to earth and reached the ground with a sharp explosive sound.

"To the Air Force pilots this was old stuff," says the article; "they had created the same sound conditions in Ohio and California."

Another pilot, who created a third "blast," explained that there was no knowledge that any damage had been caused by the "shock" technique and that "it is a perfectly harmless event."

Colonel Johnson, the article continues, "is credited with being the first man ever to cause the explosion." Engineers at the Wright development center at Dayton, Ohio, refer to the maneuvers resulting in synthetic thunderclaps as "high-compressibility" dives.

The phenomenon was first noted in the vicinity of Dayton in the spring of 1950. At the time, a series of "explosions" mystified city residents and base officials began wondering, because of the times reported, whether there could be any connection with dive tests they were then conducting.

"There was. During a controlled

experiment a Sabre jet was put into a dive at a designated altitude over a specified area and the pull-out was made at a designated level. Came the bang and discovery of another phenomenon of the jet age."

As an oddity, engineers say that the harmless "blasts," sometimes several in succession after one dive, sound much louder when the observer is inside a building.

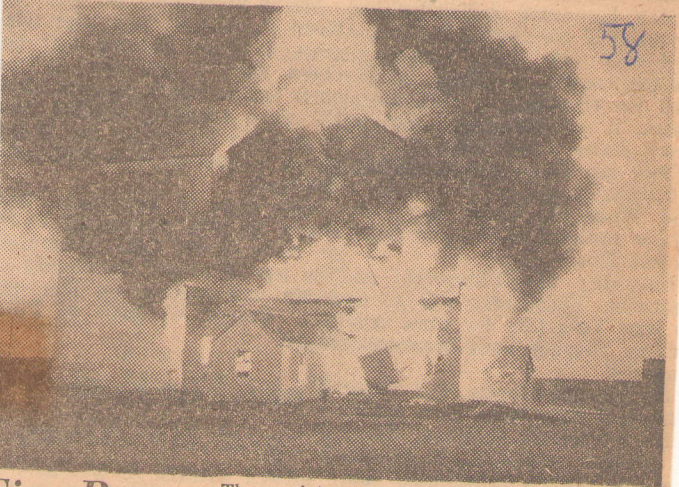
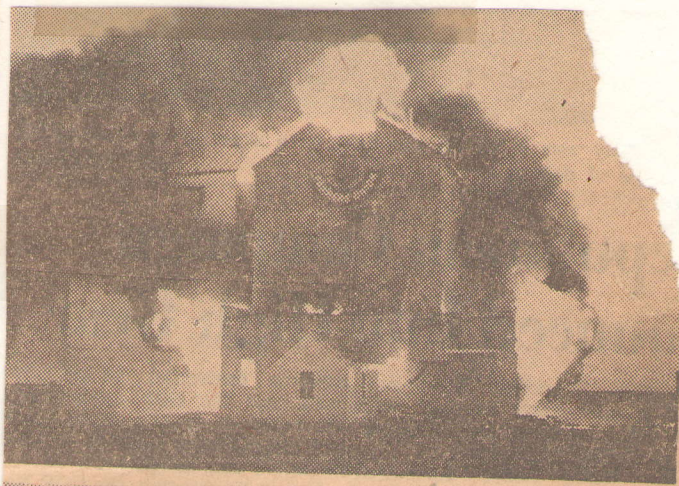

A. I. Johnson Enters Mayor Race

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Says 'Better Fargo' His Major Goal

A. I. Johnson, an attorney here since 1930, announced his candidacy for president of the Fargo City Commission at a meeting of about 50 citizens in the Powers Hotel last night.



The group, called together by A. C. Johnson, a contractor and temporary chairman, elected George Hoenck, a former city commissioner, former state senator and proprietor of a fur store, as permanent chairman. A. I. Bonk, insurance man, was named temporary secretary.

A. C. Johnson said a committee had met with Johnson earlier to urge him to run for mayor in the city election April 1 and that he had consented.

The group, in a show of hands, pledged unanimous support to Johnson's campaign.

Johnson told the group: "I have no political ambitions, but there is a strong demand for restoring greater dignity and cooperation to our city administration, free of unwarranted divisive forces.

"We have become a city divided against itself, pulling in many different directions and I think this is entirely unwarranted.

"We are a fine city with tremendous possibilities. With justified pride in Fargo and at the same time honestly and openly recognizing the unavoidable growing pains incident to progress we can, with cooperation of all our people, without distinction, build a truly great city.

"That will be my major aim. I hope I may have the support from all who want a better Fargo."

Until a few weeks ago, Johnson said, "the thought has never occurred to me" to become a candidate, "but as more and more people talked to me, I finally consented."

man."

be automatically elected. It
means we have to work hard
ing to take a house-to-house
cavass and a lot of foot work."
"We have no axes to grind or

our candidate," Hoenck said.

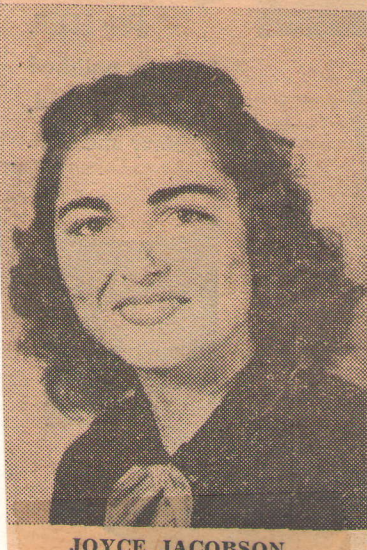

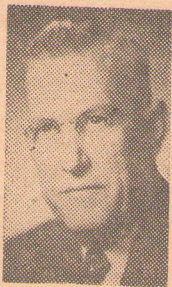
A. I. Johnson May Enter Race For Mayor; Lewis And Yoder Plan To Seek Re-election

A. I. Johnson, Fargo attorney, said Monday he is considering becoming a candidate for mayor at the April 1 city election.

Two incumbent city commissioners, P. K. Lewis and R. J. Yoder, Monday placed petitions in circulation on re-election.

Mayor Herschel Lashkowitz said he was yet undecided whether he would seek re-election.

Richard E. Blair, 24, of 1020 1st Ave. S., who in January announced

that he would be a candidate for a Commission post, filed his petitions, carrying 367 signatures, with the city auditor yesterday. Nominating petitions require 300 signatures.

Holdover commissioners are Fred C. Hagen (waterworks) and E. J. McCannel, (health).

Fargo voters also will elect two members of the Park Board. Both incumbents, Kenneth Sydness (Ken Kennedy) and Gordon S. Aamoth, announced that they will seek re-election.

Odin J. Strandness, police magistrate, has two more years of his four-year term to serve, having been elected in 1956. Likewise, the term of Milton R. Bergseth, justice of the peace, has two more years to run.

Mayor Lashkowitz made this statement:

"My time has been completely taken up with vital and pressing city matters and I have not had an adequate opportunity to give consideration to political matters.

"I am humbly grateful for the countless expressions of friendship from my fellow citizens. Their encouragement has been heartwarming.

"There are many serious factors to be fully evaluated and considered in deciding whether one will be a candidate for office. In the near future I shall have a statement concerning my plans."

Johnson said he had "been approached by quite a few people" and that he is "considering" becoming a candidate for mayor.

"If I thought that I could be of some help to the people of Fargo I would give it serious consideration," he said, adding that "I

am not seeking public office."

Johnson, a practicing lawyer, is vice consul for Norway for North Dakota and is president of the Merchants National Mutual Fire Insurance Co. He has been active in civic affairs.

Yoder, who is police, fire and garbage utility commissioner, said, "if re-elected I will carry on with the same program, working toward a better traffic light system, traffic flow, parking lots and an efficient garbage utility system."

Lewis, likewise, said he would "stand on the same platform." He is commissioner of streets, sewers and airport. He said that if re-elected he would "continue to carry out an improved and expanding street lighting system, which is now under way" and continue to work closely with the city engineering department, which is under his supervision.

Another possible candidate for the City Commission is Carl Holthe, 1718 2nd St. N., who operates an electric shop and is a member of the Fargo Urban Renewal Agency.

Holthe said he also had been approached "by several people" but that he had made no decision.

The two incumbent Park Board members, Sydness and Aamoth, are seeking election to full six-year terms. Sydness was appointed in January, 1956, to succeed Verne Noble who resigned, and was elected in April that year to fill out the unexpired term.

Aamoth was appointed in August, 1954, to succeed Emory Gestie, resigned, and was elected in 1956 to fill the unexpired term.

Blair, who was defeated in a bid for a City Commission post in 1956, is taking postgraduate work at NDAC for a degree in history and has been a part-time counsellor for the Tri-State Employment Service.

ministers the trust awards under a grant from John D. Rockefeller III.

A 1942 graduate of Concordia College, Moorhead, Dr. Johnson has been a government employe since July of 1951. His award will take him to the Far East where he will study the relative impact of Indian and Chinese influences, both in the pre-colonial period and today, on the critical area of Southeast Asia.

At present, Dr. Johnson is one of four members of the National Security Council's special staff who work closely with Robert Cutler, special assistant to the president for national security affairs. Dr. Johnson also serves as secretary of the council's special staff.

After graduating from Concordia, Dr. Johnson took his master's degree in public administration at Syracuse University in 1943 and his doctorate at Harvard in 1949 while holding a teaching fellowship in government.
